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Democracy and Labor in Japan.

The following is a free translation of an editorial appearing in The Japanese-American News in Japanese last Thursday:

ALL classes in Japan were affected when the United States entered the war for the sake of world democracy. Since the defeat of Germany the growth of democracy in Japan has been by leaps and bounds.

Japanese industrialism is yet in the formative period. Labor, long ground under the heel of the capitalistic class, recently awoke, and, like an angry giant, insisted upon its rights.

Contemporaneous with the uprising of labor was the movement for man suffrage in Japan. As a result the condition of labor already is greatly improved.

The Osaka Chamber of Commerce published last month the result of an investigation it conducted into the wages and conditions of employment of 146 classes of labor.

The Osaka Chamber of Commerce figures are for December, 1918, and the corresponding month of 1919. For convenience of the American reader the Japanese yen and cent have been reduced to their American equivalents.

While the figures of the Osaka Chamber of Commerce show wage advances in one year in Japan of from 50 per cent to 140 per cent, the New York Times the other day said the Japanese laborer is getting but 18 cents a day.

The Yawata Iron Works, a government enterprise, announced recently a policy of better treatment of laborers beginning April 1, following a strike of nearly two months' duration.

Better treatment of workers naturally redounds to the welfare of Japan. The capitalists have been forced to accord the worker better treatment by the trend of world conditions.

The victory of the laboring class is but the natural result of its insistence upon its rights, but the victory is incomplete. The Japanese laboring man is forbidden by government edict to form labor unions.

Generally speaking, the Japanese does not clearly understand his rights and responsibilities. But not so the Japanese laboring man. He is strongly insisting upon his rights.

To meet that contingency, we must encourage the formation of labor unions in Japan. Able leaders must educate the masses.

Promoting Economic Opportunity.

THE Japanese-American problem, so far as it concerns the anti-Japanese movement on the western coast of America, is one that demands for its solution an economic co-operation of the American and Japanese peoples.

The opportunity for such co-operation is drawing nearer. Recently former State Senator Charles B. Bills and Mr. K. Oki of Sacramento returned from a trip to Japan, whither they went to establish a great canning factory with American and Japanese capital.

Mr. Alexander, Dr. Wheeler and others of the Japanese-American Relations Committee, who left for Japan a few days ago, are expected to plan a bank of joint capital. What success can be realized we, of course, cannot divine.

We believe if, in the past, there had been economic co-operation between the two peoples, such co-operation might have been a great mediating factor in anti-Japanese agitation.

Economic interests are mightier than any disagreements or petty racial feelings. If the Japanese in California had placed five billion dollars in any kind of American business, or even, perhaps, one billion dollars, there might have been distinctly favorable results for the Japanese.

We do not consider that the general policy of Japanese immigrants in California during the past twenty years in disposing of their money has been wise and sound. They should have invested five or six million dollars a year in American enterprises.

Japanese are regarded as especially gifted in agricultural pursuits. We suggest that they, together with American capital, establish a factory. Let Americans furnish the machinery and carry on the sales.

The Japanese At Home and In America.

The following is the second part of an illuminating article by Mr. Kurihara, the first part of which appeared on this page Saturday, April 17. The first part concluded with a study of the legal status of the Japanese woman.

Generally, woman was regarded as physically weak. She was treated cruelly or inhumanly, as is sometimes represented in foreign countries. More than this, we have enough data and reasons to believe that woman was respected, or by her ability forced to respect towards her, even in the second period.

Perhaps one of the most spirited discussions today in Japan concerns the status of woman. Many a woman has participated and is making strenuous efforts to win a place in society equal with man.

Educating of girls and women is advancing day after day, as is evidenced by the Imperial University opening its doors to women. It was formerly for men only, but now women can easily come in contact with world-wide ideas.

As to the causes of immigration in general: (1) lack of food; (2) lack of territory for an expanding population; (3) war; (4) the labor market; (5) government to get free from the oppression of unjust government; (6) religion—to escape from religious persecution and intolerance.

That could America do to establish a closer relationship between the real America and the people of Japan living here? The following four points may be presented as my own personal opinions or suggestions: (1) Real understanding of the Japanese in America.

It is hardly necessary to say anything for or against a clear and true understanding of the Japanese in America. The Japanese people are little understood abroad. This is true in this country.

There are several causes which somehow make it difficult for the Japanese to adjust themselves to America. (1) Because both peoples were isolated and separated from each other so long, having different traditions, history and racial experiences.

The racial sentiment is one of the most delicate psychological phenomena. On the positive side as racial prejudice and on the negative side as racial prejudice, there is a universal, concomitant phenomenon of any race.

As for linguistic difficulties: Thoughts and sentiments are largely expressed through the medium of language. In adjusting one people to the other's ideal and standard, naturally language plays the most important role.

Looking over the evolution of world civilization, all agree that modern civilization is not the result of the exclusion of heterogeneous elements. On the contrary, it is the result of combination, amalgamation and assimilation of all heterogeneous elements.

SUNRISE ON THE OCEAN.

BEING awakened by the noise of billows I rose and opened the door. It was on the early morning of November 4th, in the twelfth year of Meiji at the Saimiichi Choshi.

Looking over the eastern sky, I saw smoked birch color lying along the horizon. A little higher up, the crescent moon like a golden bow was shining dimly as if to govern the eastern swamp.

The water became whiter and whiter and the eastern sky more yellow. The crescent moon and the lighthouse, having gradually faded, became at last invisible.

Five minutes passed, and then ten minutes. The eastern sky, while I gazed, shot out golden sparks and suddenly a crimson point floated over the far end of the sea.

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On stated days all the saisen coffers of the temple are emptied under the supervision of four priests and mountains of coins of various denominations are piled up.

While the monthly income is large, the expenses of the temple are not inconsiderable. Repairs alone amount to 5,000 to 10,000 yen a year.

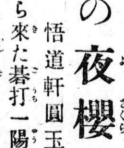
