Setting a Good Example.

ALTHOUGH THE EXTENT and details of diplomatic discussion held at the meeting of the "Big Three" last Friday night still remain a mystery...

ALL CALIFORNIA has been interested in the controversy waged over Miss Yuki Furuta, selected to deliver the valedictory in the commencement exercises of the graduating class of the Oakland High School...

Miss Yuki Furuta, a student in the high senior class of the Oakland High School, has been selected by the school authorities to represent the graduating class in the January commencement exercises...

When the boys and girls of the high senior class learned of the honor that had been conferred upon a Japanese girl they were dissatisfied and launched a movement to oppose and to nullify, if possible, the arrangement...

The inspiration of the "revolt" came from high school youths whose ideas are in a transient state, so the incident may not be sufficiently serious to merit criticism...

Japanese children born in this country, as a rule, are very clever and make a good showing in their school work. The consensus of opinion of public school teachers, it seems, coincides with our observation...

This is good news not alone to Japanese parents; all Americans should feel the same way about it. For while the parents of these children are Japanese, the native born children are regular Americans...

Suppose the brains of these little Americans were not so clear and they could not master the curriculum of the schools. Then, in the not far distant future, America would be awaking to a realization that these were not desirable citizens...

Some Japanese, in the past, always have charged that Japanese children born in this country are unassimilable, or lack the quality requisite to become good American citizens...

The ideas, feelings and tastes of the young children are thoroughly American. This tendency toward Americanization is facilitated by the tendency of the public schools' brand of education...

Much praise is due to Japanese parents for the whole-hearted manner in which they are bringing up their young Japanese Americans. Right now Japanese are excluded and ostracized; this cannot be denied...


"If you take this delicate little affair so seriously as that I may not do it, but, still, I get to request you to treat me with more kindly respect and prepare more fine things for eat by dinner."
