YOUTH FROM JAPAN INTERVIEWED AT DUKE UNIVERSITY

Minoru Uwazumi Gives Views on Japan's Student Life, Social Movements, Politics

In a students' paper published at the Duke University in North Carolina, the following interesting article by Harold Ellison appeared in the issue of March 24:

Declares American Exclusion Act Justified

When asked if he thought that a true friendship between the two countries could be engendered with the present American exclusion act remaining effective, Uwazumi answered affirmatively.

Karl Marx in Japan

"Uwazumi is very solicitous over the economic welfare of his country. 'During the European War,' he said in correct grammatical, yet poorly enunciated, terms, 'there was plenty of money in Japan. People wore beautiful clothes and had a good time. But the war ended. There were many, what you call in America, 'strikes,' There was a wave of Karl Marx and socialist movements. Then came along the great earthquake. I want to say that all Japanese thank Americans for their help in this calamity. But the money has all left Japan. I don't understand it. Japan is in bad economic condition. So I want to study economics to help to get my country in good condition again.'

Describes Japanese Student Life

"I want to tell you about Japanese college life," spoke up Uwazumi, before he could be asked. 'Most of the boys around here think that Japanese students don't have a good time. But they do. In the colleges, archery, jiu-jitsu, and fencing are required for one year. They play tennis, baseball, a game with a round ball which they kick between two goals (evidently the game we know as soccer). They have German, English, and Literary societies in which, after a student has made a speech, that speech is criticized or praised by all the other members of the society. Talks are often made on such subjects as 'What is Love?' and 'Platonic Love.'"
