THE PULITZER PRIZE

Sinclair Lewis, in refusing the \$1000 Pulitzer prize offered for his novel, has exercised his right of self-exploitation. His dramatic gesture, denouncing the award as forcing writers to be sane, polite and sterile, savors not a little of Menken's ingenious advertising stunt conducted in Boston recently. Both incidents smack of the spectacular, and both are eminently suited for the front-page news.

The one thousand dollars offered to Lewis may seem a mighty enticing lump-sum to the army of writers who produce worst sellers, but to such an eminently successful writer of best sellers as Lewis the sum is a paltry one and is worthy of being sneezed at—when convenient. And what an effective sneezing this enterprising author made of that one thousand! By his dramatic refusal he has increased the sale of his book to cover the amount of the award many times over.

TOKYO MUNICIPAL CAMPAIGN AT FEVERISH STAGE

Tokyo, May 7.—The election for members of the municipal council of Tokyo is now going on merrily, showing every indication of the potential power of the common citizenry recently enfranchised by universal manhood suffrage. All the political parties are feverishly campaigning to further strengthen their respective positions in Council. The bitter fight of the campaign, however, is being waged between the Kensei-kai and the Seiyukai parties, the two big rival parties in the Diet. The Kensei-kai has at present sixty candidates in the field with the avowed purpose of wresting control of the metropolitan council, while the Seiyukai has matched its rival party in the number of candidates. The latter party is equally determined to drive away the power of the Kensei-kai from the council and also to deal a fatal blow to the present councilors who are controlled by that conniving politician, Viscount Goto. Into this political fray the Jitsugyo Doshishi is shortly expected to cast its lot. The general fight among these parties is keeping the Tokyo political arena at white heat.

JAPANESE FLYERS PLAN HOP TO EAST INDIES

The first attempt to fly as far as the Dutch East Indies will be made shortly by the Sasebo Naval Flying Corps. Trial flights are being conducted between Sasebo and Shanghai, to insure success for the daring enterprise.

Party Greeted by Special English Columns

The members of the Nichi-Bei Kengaku-Dan were accorded an enthusiastic welcome in Okayama. The two leading papers of the city devoted much space to articles on the movements of the party. The Sanyo Shimpō printed a striking editorial, comment favorably upon the Nichi-Bei party.

RETIRED SUPREME COURT JUDGE LAUDS JAPANESE PEOPLE

"The United States Congressmen and Senators who seek to insult the Japanese government are the worst enemies this country has. The Japanese are reliable and efficient, and it is preposterous to think that the United States would go to war with Japan," declared Judge John H. Clark, who came aboard the Cunard liner Franconia, which made its way into port here on May 7, on its fourth globe-circling voyage.

Judge Clark was appointed Justice of the United States Supreme Court by President Wilson in 1916 and retired at the age of 65 to devote his time to travel, reading, and service in public causes. Clarke is a Democrat and a strong advocate of the League of Nations. One of his offices is that of president of the League of Nations Nonpartisan Association. "Friends of peace in the United States should organize to the end of promulgating world peace," said Clark.

KANGAKU-DAN IN OSAKA

Party Visits Army Division Headquarter:

In the afternoon of April 6 the Nichi-Bei Kengaku-Dan visited the headquarters of the Fourth Division of the Japanese Army. Captain Koyama, aide-de-camp, showed the party all the important places in the famous Osaka Castle, in which the Division headquarter is located. He invited the party to the Kishu-Goten, which was moved from Wakayama Castle and later used by Emperor Meiji as his headquarter during a military maneuver. This building is usually prohibited to the general public, but the Division headquarter gave the Nichi-Bei party the privilege of viewing this historic structure and an opportunity of being entertained in it.

"Your First Consideration is U. S." Says Army Officer:

As the Division commander was in Tokyo, the staff-officer of the Division, Colonel Miyake, entertained the Nichi-Bei party in his behalf. He gave an instructive talk, in which he said: "You young people are American-born American citizens. Above all things and under all circumstances you must give your country first consideration and contribute to her culture and civilization, thus automatically enhancing the reputation of Japan." The point was greatly emphasized by the Japanese military officer, who deeply impressed the members of the Kengaku-Dan. Following this address the young visitors from America enjoyed the scenery from the Tenshukaku, the principal tower of the castle.
