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EDITORIAL

JAPAN'S NEW FACTORY LAW

THE revised Factory Law, which was passed by the last session of the Japanese Diet and put into operation on July 1, is a tremendous piece of social legislation, affecting 150,000 factory workers. While the act does not go far enough in its program of protection for the workers, it is nevertheless a great stride over the old law, which it supersedes. The following are the salient points of the new act as compared with the former:

The prohibition of child labor has been extended to all industries, whereas some limitations were contained in the old law.

The hours for protected workers (women and workers of either sex between the ages of fourteen and sixteen) have been shortened from twelve to eleven hours per day, maximum, including one hour's recess.

The age limit for juvenile workers was twelve, whereas the new law places the limit at fourteen, with minor exceptions for lighter labor for twelve-year-old workers.

The new act provides for general increase of relief to be paid by employers for injuries, deaths, sickness, etc.

Under the new act an employee must be given fourteen days' notice before being dismissed, or else he must be paid fourteen days' additional wages

Paavo Nurmi, famous Finnish runner, established what is proclaimed as a new world record Tuesday, July 13, at Stockholm, Sweden, when he covered 3,000 meters in 8 minutes 20.4-10 seconds. Edward Wide, the Swedish champion, was second, covering the distance in 8 minutes 20.8-10 seconds. The old record was 8 minutes 25.4-10 seconds.

A woman who has been delivered of a child is allowed to stay at home for six weeks, although this period may be shortened to four weeks by physician's opinion.

"Night work" as understood in the old act was labor between the hours of 10:00 p. m. and 4:00 a. m., whereas the new law defines the term as being between 10:00 p. m. and 5:00 a. m. Night work in this sense is forbidden for protected workers three years after July 1, 1926, except in the case of workers in filature, silk goods manufacture and cotton spinning, who received the benefit of this provision simultaneously with the operation of the law.

100 STUDENTS, 12 TEACHERS FROM JAPAN TO TOUR CALIFORNIA SHORTLY

Extensive Receptions by Kiwanis and "Y" Clubs Await Members of Party

Departing from Yokohama on July 10, on the N. Y. K. liner, Shinnyo Maru, the first group of the Japanese students traveling party, which is sponsored and conducted by Honorable Kaju-Nakamura, member of Japan's Diet, will arrive in San Francisco with a message of goodwill on July 26.

The Japanese student tour is divided into two groups, each composed of 50 students and 6 teachers, totaling the numbers of 100 students and 12 teachers. The students were selected from a list of more than 500 applicants who were desirous of coming to America to investigate and to promote closer relationship between the two nations.

The second group is leaving Yokohama on July 24 on S. S. Siberia Maru and is expected to reach San Francisco on August 6.

Upon their arrival here, both groups will be accorded with receptions by the American Y. M. C. A., Japanese Y. M. C. A., Consul General Taketomi, and the International "Y" at the University of California. A luncheon program is also arranged by the Kiwanis Club of San Francisco, Oakland, Berkeley, and Alameda and by the San Francisco Rotary Club. Sight-seeing tour will be conducted by the local American Chamber of Commerce.

Visits to Stanford University, University of California, Mills College and principal points of interests in and about San Francisco and Northern and Central California will be made.
