NO NATION HAS SO PUNCTILIOUSLY FULFILLED ITS OBLIGATIONS WITH U. S. AS JAPAN SAYS EDUCATOR

EDITORIAL

FORD BUILDS A FLYING FLIVVER

N his sixty-third birthday, celebrated a few days ago, Henry Ford displayed his characteristic enterprise by exhibiting an airplane measuring 20 feet from the tip of one wing to the other. It weighs 320 pounds and contains a 25 horsepower motor capable of propelling the craft at the rate of 100 miles per hour. Although he states that he is not yet ready to announce the production of his flying flivvers in quantities, Mr. Ford will ultimately produce them and produce them more cheaply and satisfactorily than any other manufacturer.

America has been lagging in commercial air craft development as compared with some of the European countries. But there is one thing which America excel and that is the bigness of her Big Business. And when the man behind the helm of Big Business decides that time is ripe for commercial air craft expansion, America will soar above all her competitors in her characteristic big way.

The vanguard of our commercial aviation will be composed of just such crafts as the one exhibited by Henry Ford. They can be produced in great numbers and cheaply. And Mr. Ford is the man to do it. He has machinery; he has capital. Furthermore, he possess personal qualities necessary for undertaking big enterprises. He made his flivvers known to every portion of the globe. He can make his aerial flivvers just as popular and just as effective.

Japan Recognizes Right of Nation to Restrict Immigration:

The spirit of Japanese in the face of the exclusion act has demonstrated her possession of the real principles of Christian statesmanship. Recognizing the right of every nation to restrict or limit immigration, Japan has based her protest against this act upon the discriminatory treatment provided for. Japan would file no objection were she placed upon the same basis in the immigration act as are other nations of the world.

America Has Broken Faith With Friendly Power:

Perhaps the most serious phrase of the exclusion program is found in the fact that the thoughtful citizens of America realize that we have broken faith with a nation whose traditions of progress are bound up with American life. Seventy years ago the United States forced the commercial gates of Japan wide open to world. In the exclusion act we have forcibly closed the doors of opportunity in America against the nationals of a friendly power. In a recent article in the Atlantic Monthly by Mr. E. A. Powell, he began by saying: "The most important country in the world to America today is Japan". In the Los Angeles Times, Harry Carr recently said in the Lancer's column: "Japan has been the most cruelly, brutally misjudged nation with whom we have had relations so punctiliously and honorably lived up to its obligations". In these days when most of the other great nations are fingering their noses at us as they tear up their promises, we begin to appreciate the spirit with which Japan carried through "The Gentleman's Agreement"—an agreement harder for Japan to carry out than it would be for the European nations to repay us the money borrowed".

Ambassador Wood's Resignation Is Protest Against Exclusion Act:

WORLD RECORD IN 440 BEAST STROKE BROKEN BY SPENCE

Johnny Weissmuller Takes Quarter Free Style Event

Previous time for the 440-yard breast stroke was left in the shade by 13.35 seconds in the National A. A. U. swimming championship meet at the Sequentennial swimming pool at Philadelphia July 28. Walter Spence of the Brooklyn Central Y. M. C. A. established the new world's record of 6.1645.

Johnny Weissmuller, Illinois A. C., won the national title in the 440-yard free style swim, defeating his teammate Arne Borg, in a close finish. Weissmuller's time for the quarter was 5.2145. He holds the American record of 5.0745.

In winning in the breast-stroke event, Spence dethroned Robert Skelton of the Illinois A. C., who won the 1925 championship. Skelton finished three yards behind the Brooklyn swimmer.
