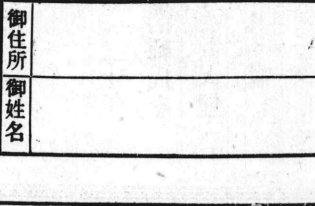

JAPAN DAVIS CUP STARS BREAK EVEN WITH FRENCH

Come Close To Making Clean Sweep of Frenchmen; Unexpected Strength Shown

Japan's Davis Cup team surprised the entire sporting public Thursday, August 26, when they displayed sensational and unexpected strength against France's formidable forces and held them to an even break in the opening two singles matches of the inter-zone series, which will determine the challenger of America in the international tennis competition.

Takeichi Harada conquered Rene La Coste, ace of the Frenchmen, in four bitterly fought sets, 6-4, 4-6, 6-3, 9-7, making, as a matter of fact, almost a clean sweep. Henri Cochet escaped from defeat by a spectacular rally and pinned Tsumio Tawara in five sets, 1-6, 4-6, 7-5, 6-3, 6-2.

The record stands even at one match all, and the winner of Friday's doubles match, in which Harada and Tawara will oppose Cochet and Jaques Brugnon, will have the edge when the teams go into the deciding singles Saturday.

The even break of Thursday came as a stunning surprise to France's topnotchers, who had been favored for capturing the international honor. Tawara attacked Cochet, outdriving him in the first two sets, but the latter found himself just in time to avert defeat. La Coste was unable to cope with Harada's batting ram attacks.
