Thursday, at the Sesqui-Centennial Stadium, Philadelphia, more than 130,000 persons paid in excess of \$2,000,000 to witness two fighters pound each other for victory. Tex Rickard, promoter of the fight, estimates that approximately 20,000 women witnessed Gene Tunney batter Jack Dempsey through ten rounds, and some of the women "were so close that the blood of the tottering champion spattered on their pretty frocks."

One thousand nine hundred years have elapsed since the time Nero conducted the gory spectacles in the Roman arena. Modern school teachers recite of these frightful combats arranged to amuse the Roman rabble "in those olden days." Yet, last Thursday, more than 130,000 citizens of one of the most enlightened modern countries of the world, paid over \$2,000,000 to see what, according to Brisbane, is nothing but an exhibition to see which of the two men is nearer Orang Outang. Human progress in a slow process.
