In order to introduce Japan and her beautiful scenery to the world and encourage foreign tourists to visit that country, the Toyo Kisen Kaisha Steamship Line, before its amalgamation with the N. Y. K. line, had been issuing a monthly publication, the Japan Magazine. When the Nippon Yusen Kaisha took over the old T. K. K., the magazine was automatically transferred to the new organization.

Under the new organization the Japan Magazine, an artistic travel magazine, profusely illustrated with beautiful cuts, has been enlarged, under the supervision of its editor, Mr. Steele, who was retained when the publication changed hands. Formerly, about 5,000 copies were issued, but at present more than 10,000 copies are printed every month.
