Major General Sano Departs for Vancouver; Plans To Lead Japan Scouts on American Tour

Major General Tsunehisa Sano of Japan, who is on a tour through the United States following his attendance at International Boy Scout Council held at Switzerland recently, left San Francisco Monday evening, 7 o'clock, on the Shasta Limited, and is speeding toward Vancouver, where he will depart for Homeland on the Empress of Russia. Sano represented the Boy Scout organization of Japan at the International Council.

In an interview conducted with a Japanese American News representative prior to his departure, Major General Sano declared in the following manner:

Receives Hearty Welcome

"I had not planned upon this American tour when I started out from my native country, but at the Switzerland Conference I was persuaded to take the trip on my way home through the invitation of the American representative at the Scout Council. In America I was received with such hearty welcome that I am leaving this country with a happy recollection."

I have been persuaded by representative Americans to lead a group of Japanese Boy Scouts on an American tour and thus contribute toward American-Japanese friendship by having the youths of Japan come in contact with the youths of America. The moving spirit of the Boy Scout organization is universal brotherhood. For this reason it is fitting this organization should be utilized for fostering better relationship between the two Pacific nations.
