Results of the Imperial Conference

The British Imperial Conference which began month ago, has achieved far-reaching results. It defined the political status of the dominions with the mother country. Every dominion is now a self-governing member of the British Empire and master of its destiny. The governors general of dominions are henceforth representatives of the king as sovereign and not of the home government or any British department of state.

The practical effect of the decision arrived at the conference is the placing of the dominions on equal footing with Britain. In matters affecting common interests, a common policy will be pursued. Where individual interests only are concerned, each dominion may make its own separate treaties. The foreign office, however, has obtained the sanction of the dominions to guide the general conduct of the foreign policy.

Aside from political aspects, the conference has achieved far-reaching results in the economic sphere. The British Empire will, in effect, become a potential economic league, with free exchange of raw material and merchandise, pooling of resources, and economic co-operation instead of competition, thus eliminating all wastes and producing the utmost harmony and efficiency possible.


