Houdini Beyond the Death Line

Harry Houdini, that one-time showman and magician par excellence of America and Europe, must be greatly amused in his home in the Great Beyond, were he to learn that "dozens and dozens" of spiritualist mediums are giving Mrs. Houdini messages purported to have come from across the infinite. The magician, who in his palmiest days had commanded the interest of Europe and America, was an exposé of fraudulent practices of fake mediums.

Harry Houdini is declared to have said, in an interview conducted some time before his death, that:

"I do not believe in spiritualism as practised by so-called mediums. I believe the spirits return, because to my way of thinking they are on a plane of thought which renders it as impossible for them to communicate with us earth folks as it is for the sleeper to communicate with his friend who is awake."

Yet a curiosity absorbed the wizard, for before his death he composed a quotation of ten words, of which his wife alone shared the knowledge. So far not one of the messages received from mediums by Mrs. Houdini could be identified as the key words composed by him to be transmitted across the death line.

Houdini did not believe in spiritualism, but he believed in reincarnation. He
