Muddled Republican Victory in Maine

Republicans won the Senatorial contest in Maine yesterday. Arthur R. Gould, Republican, defeated his Democrat opponent by approximately 50,000 votes. Thus the nominal Republican control of the Senate in the seventieth Congress is assured. The news is in no way unusual, as the outcome of the election merely confirmed what was generally conceded: that Maine would send a Republican Senator to Washington.

The contest, however, is significant because it brings once more the question of money in politics. The Republican victory in Maine was muddled with charges of illegal primary campaign expenditures. The charges were filed by a leading member of the Ku Klux Klan. The Republican Governor, Ralph O. Brewster, backed up the charges, though he denied membership in the Klan. The Secretary of State, after a hearing, threw the charges out on the ground of insufficient evidence. Meanwhile the defeated candidate is going to take the charges to Washington.

One of the recognized defects of a democracy is the tendency to let money play an inordinate part in politics, thus converting what is nominally a democracy into plutocracy in fact. General Pershing made a pertinent statement recently, in which he said:
