CHINESE-JAPANESE GRID CLASSIC INSTILLS WORTHY CAUSE

Amity Between Two Nationalities Is Object of Football Game

Everything is being formed into good shape for a lively Chinese-Japanese football classic that is expected to thrill hundreds of Bay District fans on Saturday, December 11, at Ewing Field; but the great cause that underlies in this contact between the two races is worthy of the highest praise.

The game has for its purpose the noble outlook of stimulating closer relationship between the two races and is not merely a test of physical superiority. In order to verify the fact, we print the following which was submitted by a member of the Japanese squad and observed by every member.

"Our athletic relations are merely the first step toward greater and if not better ultimate ends. The Chinese's aim which we hope to further adopt, is to get the common Asiatic races into racial and personal relations to become more amiable and less isolated. We feel that these two younger generations have many things in common, particularly in future social standing, and in order to facilitate the solving of this and similar problems together and effectively, union of thought, if not action, is necessary. We think that this football game is the first step toward this end.

"But in spite of the excitement and heat of the coming engagement, we have not lost sight of our aim. This coming Sunday, December 5, the Young People's Christian Society of San Francisco has been invited to a joint Christian Service and social hour with the Chinese Christian Lung-Chih Association. Every Christian young person is invited to attend, and every one is urged to come. The service will be held at 925 Stockton Street, Chinese Presbyterian Church."
