Japanese Salvation Army Head on Hawaiian Youth

Staff Captain Kobayashi's observation of Hawaiian youth is noteworthy because it is undistorted. Mr. Kobayashi was sent to Hawaii last December by the Japanese Salvation Army headquarters located here in San Francisco, and on his arrival back to the mainland a few days ago he declared that youths of Hawaii, being reared in a Japanese atmosphere of parental discipline, possess a spirit of respect and obedience to elders.

Further analysis of Mr. Kobayashi's observation is interesting. He says, for instance, that the second-generation in Hawaii is about fifteen years older than those on the mainland. He even met a Hawaiian-born citizen of thirty-nine years of age, while the thirty-year-old citizen is very common among the Japanese group there. These second-generation members in general speak and read Japanese with ease. Mr. Kobayashi then concludes that the immigration of the Hawaiian youth, with their knowledge of Japanese, into the mainland, would prove beneficial to the misunderstanding relation between the two generations here. That is a good suggestion.

FRESNO JAPANESE SCOUTS WILL VIE FOR HONORS AT SCOUT CONTEST ON FRI. SAT.

Japanese Are Urged To Attend Fresno Scout Exhibition; Japanese Scouts To Compete in Demonstration and Contest at Civic Auditorium

The ever active Boy Scouts of Troop 16 of Fresno will participate in the Boy Scouts Exposition, the first of its kind to be held in Fresno, at the Civic Auditorium, on Friday and Saturday, February 10 and 11.

AMERICANS GLAD TO HELP JAPANESE SCOUTS:

The Japanese Scouts have been most favorably received by the Americans, and in this contest with over seventeen other troops in competition for merit badges and prizes, the local Rotarians are assisting them in every way possible. The Americans have assured the boys that they would gladly help them if they were asked to do so.

EXPOSITION DIVIDED INTO TWO PARTS:

The Exposition is divided into two parts. The booths where Boy Scouts are furnished with appropriate materials to the subject chosen, such as Fire Prevention—the boys would show a little forest and its effect from careless fires. The Japanese Scouts have planned to decorate their booths, all in a row. When you enter the Auditorium, you will face a horizontal line of booths before you. Their booths are the first five on the right-hand side, facing toward the platform or the stage. These booths are on exhibition from

7:30 to 8:15.

After the booths are closed, the competition among the troops in activities begin. Second part—Troop 16 will compete in the "pyramid formation," fire-making through friction, stretcher drill and "Flap-Jack" contests. The last mentioned one will be represented by Minoru Ichinose and George Aki. One will start a fire by rubbing with sticks, while the other will prepare the flap-jack batter.

JAPANESE SCOUTS TO FRY CAKES:

Fresno Boy Scouts will then fry the cakes in the pans, fling them across to each other over a distance, and try to catch the cake from the opposite side in the frying pan again. It's going to be lots of fun to watch this!

There are five good buglers chosen from the different troops, and Troop 16 is represented by two from the same organization, Kikuo Taira and Ikuya Kawai. The Troop 16 Harmonica Band will probably play too.

Nissei Quintet Cops Seventh and Eighth Straight Victories

Under the able coaching of Hiroshi Yamamoto, a running guard of the Berkeley High School 130-pound team which is expected to win the Class B title of Northern California, the 115-pounders of the Nissei Club shot through two more triumphs over the Willard and Burbank fives.

NISSEI SWAMPS WILLARD

The first game with the Burlingame cagers proved to be a "runaway" with the Nissei shooters sinking fourteen field goals from all corners of the court, to win, 28-5.

In the second game, the Nissei had a harder "sliding." The Burbank defense was unusually strong in the first half and held the Nissei quintet to a single bucket, while Burbank forwards managed to drop in a field goal and a foul to lead at the end of the first half, 3-2. But after tossing out "five good men and true" came back with a savage rush and swept down the floor to put in three field goals and a free throw while the "five-men defense" worked perfectly to completely check the Burbank shooters. The Nissei "samurais" coming out on top again, 9-3.

Shigei Yamamoto Ernie Takaki and Yo Tabata starred in the first game, while Frank Kawakami Chui Shimamoto Tad Yoshimura and Bob Takefule were the "Four Samurais" in the second contest.

On Friday night, February 11, the Oakland Y. M. B. A. will play a return game with the Nissei Club who won the first clash by a close score of 14-12. The game will be played on the Willard School Court, and all the rooters of Oakland and Berkeley are urged to turn out for the coming fray.
