FRESNO SCOUTS WIN SILVER TROPHY AND TREMENDOUS OVATION AT SCOUT EXHIBIT

Japanese Troop No. 16 Achieves First Place at Civic Exposition; Troop No. 35 Makes Good Impression; Thundering Cheers Given Boys

Troop 16 of Fresno Boy Scouts won the huge silver loving cup as the first prize in the first annual Boy Scout Exposition held in Fresno, February 11 and 12. The Japanese troop won the cup for being the best appearing troop among eighteen other troops that entered in competition with the Japanese boys.
