

















## PREMIER TANAKA AND MINISTER TAKAHASHI EXPLAIN THREE BILLS

Opposition Party Demands  
Explanation of Government's General Policies

TOKYO, May 5.—The Government submitted three bills to the Imperial Diet yesterday. One of the bills provides that the Bank of Japan shall make special advances to the various individual banks in order to stabilize Japan's financial condition.

The second bill provides for the advancement of relief to the Bank of Taiwan. The third bill demands the approval of the Imperial moratorium by the Diet.

The second day of the Diet opened this morning at 10:20 a.m. The Premier, Giichi Tanaka, and Finance Minister Korekiyo Takahashi explained the three bills submitted to the Diet by the Government.

Messrs. Iwakiri, Ogawa, Kuroda, and Yamada, all members of the new opposition party, queried the Premier and the Finance Minister on various points of the three bills, followed by lengthy discussion. The bills were finally referred to a special investigating committee.

During the session of the Diet today considerable interest was created when Togokichi Tabuchi and Genji Matsuda demanded an outline of the new cabinet's general policies. The Premier refused to comply with the demand.




