Comment here is unnecessary, for the mere recital of the fact is an eloquent tribute to the tenacity of the American youth who has struggled ardently to master an exceedingly complicated language that is alien to his parents.

The world loves a fighter. There is something appealing to the imagination in the spectacle of a young man struggling against odds and overcoming them. It is for this reason that Lincoln, the railsplitter, stirs our pride. It is also for this reason that the famous Japanese who studied at night by the light of the fireflies in a paper bag and the sage who pursued knowledge by the light of snow have become shining examples for every boy in Japan. Now John Anderton sets a worthy example for second-generation young people.

## Language School Again

The recent announcement issued by Attorney-General Webb relative to enforcement of the State foreign language school statutes should gladden the hearts of every true American. Mr. Webb declared, in effect, that he will not enforce the existing statutes because they are unconstitutional. For the United States Supreme Court, passing upon a similar law in Hawaii, held it to be in conflict with the spirit of the Constitution.

At 1 o'clock the races started with the 440 and 800-yard dashes. Half an hour later, trumpet blew and the pupils of the Oakland Japanese school lined up for a grand march. At the end of the "big parade" the youthful voices burst into an exultant paean to their school, based on the air of a famous Japanese naval song.

Dr. Smith Gives Stirring Address on "Saddest Words Ever Spoken"

Altho a great outdoor picnic had been held at Albany, and consequently, many members of the Oakland M. E. Church were too tired to attend, there was an enthusiastic audience of over fifty Japanese people to welcome Dr. Frank Herro Smith, who is holding an "Oakland Week" this week, by giving lectures at the Japanese community centers.

The Oakland M. E. meeting was conducted by James Hirano, and after several hymns had been sung, he introduced Dr. Smith, who, first, however, gave a vocal solo, "Remember thy creator in the days of thy youth."

For the subject of his talk Dr. Smith took the twenty-sixth verse of the twenty-fourth chapter of Mathews, "it were better for that man if he had not been born." Dr. Swift's message was delivered in a clear, concise manner, and her attitude was both sympathetic and unaffected. Her audience in the afternoon, composed of girls over 15 years of age, was as large as the one in Los Angeles, according to Dr. Swift.

Mothers of the girls attended in the later part of the afternoon following the lecture to the older girls. Fully seventy-five mothers attended and learned the importance of hygiene, and the means of imparting hygienic knowledge to children. Mrs. Takeno of Madera acted as interpreter.

The dinner given in her honor on Friday night at the Hotel Californian was attended by many prominent Japanese of Fresno. Many social problems were discussed at this time and all those who were present at this dinner praised Dr. Swift's apt presentation and her choice of fitting words.

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To the surprise of all the young people in attendance, John Anderton, a student of the Kinmon Gakuen, delivered an impressive speech in fluent Japanese at the meeting of the San Francisco Young People's Epworth League last Sunday.
