### Friendship Dolls

(By Sidney L. Gulick)

"The reception of the dolls was wonderful, far greater than our most enthusiastic workers anticipated," declares Rev. Sidney L. Gulick, secretary of the committee on World Friendship Among Children, in a letter to Mrs. Herman F. Swartz, chairman of the Berkeley committee. Mr. Gulick continues: "The story has been coming to us by cables from Foreign Minister Shidehara and from Viscount Shibusawa, the 'Grand Old Man' of Japan, who was chairman of the Japanese Committee on World Friendship Among Children; by letters and photographs from the vice-minister of education that made possible the joy of the children; by letters from Mrs. Bowles, the chairman of the Tokyo committee of American women; by letters from individuals who took part in the official welcomes or saw or received dolls; and by the Japanese newspapers.

Every important newspaper carried stories of the dolls, and many had pictures. The Asahi-graph, the only pictorial weekly in the east, published by the Tokyo Asahi Shimbun, Tokyo, Japan, devoted nine of the 24 pages of its issue of March 1 to the dolls, and called it "American Doll-Messengers Welcome Number."
