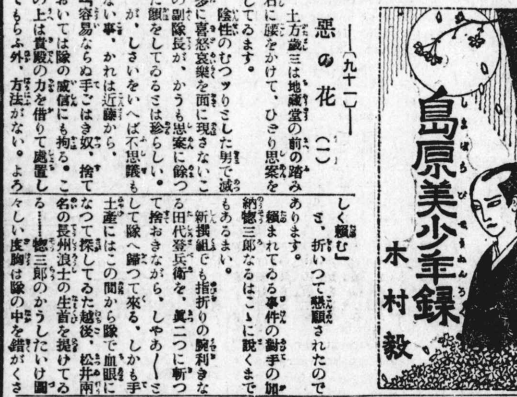

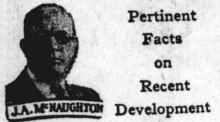

The Livestock Situation



In centralizing the livestock supply at marketing centers it is possible to determine the packer demand and gauge the flow of livestock as closely as possible to meet this and no more.

However, when the foreign element of direct movement is injected into the situation, even though representing only a small percentage of the total volume, immediately the buying power at the marketing center is split and the tendency is toward depression until the outside supply has been absorbed and the demand returns to normal.

This situation however, is correcting itself as the tendency on the part of the producers is constantly toward placing their activities on a more business like and economical basis.

Fatal Break in Fifth Causes Algon's Downfall, 10 to 13

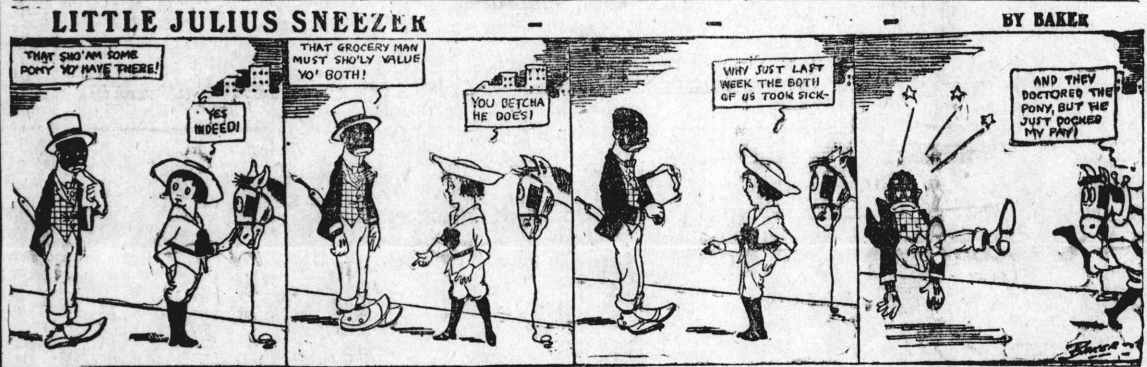
