

JAPAN SCORES TWO WINS OVER MEXICO TEAM IN DAVIS TENNIS MATCHES

Ohta Defeats Bob Kinsey in Five-Set Battle at St. Louis

ST. LOUIS, July 29—The Japanese team won the first two matches from Mexico in the American zone of the Davis Cup international tennis tournament.

The first match, which was played in the Triple A Club court here between Yoshiro Ohta and Robert Kinsey, was a hard-fought five-set battle, the Japanese contender winning by 2-6, 6-4, 6-1, 6-2, 6-2.

This victory of the Japanese over the veteran Bob Kinsey is regarded as a successful test of the high caliber of the team from Japan which is expected to put a formidable front against the European zone winners.

This year's tournament is Yoshiro Ohta's first appearance in international play. He is an instructor at a girls' high school in Manchuria, where he is said to be every girl frosh's first love. Invading Japan, he played a series of victorious games there, emerging as Japan's singles champion.

The other Japanese victory over Mexico was won by the veteran player, Takeichi Harada, who beat Alonso Unda in three straight sets, 6-2, 6-3, 6-3.

In the Kinsey-Ohta match, the Mexican representative started out brilliantly, bewildering his opponent with his effective chop strokes in the first set. In the second set, Ohta regained his balance, though Kinsey still trimmed him neatly. The third set marked the turning point, and Japanese player attacked with great skill, attaining the final victory despite Kinsey's heroic defense.

The schedules for tomorrow will be a double match between Harada and Captain Zenzo Shimizu of Japan against the Mexican combination of Robert Kinsey and Claude Buttlin. Kinsey and Buttlin hold five titles in Mexico and have yet to suffer defeat as a doubles team.
