Australia and Problem Of Pacific's Population

Dr. Macmillan Brown, chancellor of the University of New Zealand, who has attended several of the conferences called by the Pan-Pacific Union, has made a life-long study of race and population in the Pacific. He is recently quoted as follows:

"Around and in the Pacific will be two-thirds of the human race before the present century is out. The East and the West have formed their standards for thousands of years—apart. Their standards wholly differ. The important difference is in the economic standard, because where the East and West meet will be in the markets of the world. If the labor of the East comes into direct conflict with that of the West, I am quite certain one of them will be defeated."

"There is no such virile race on earth as the Chinese. Nature has there produced a perfect human labor machine, capable of doing the maximum of work with the minimum of sustenance. And the result will be that the West, which has attained a high standard of living, will have no chance in the struggle. Moreover, China is still in the lap of nature—Japan to a certain extent also. Nature will always keep Chinese labor efficient and virile."

"The problem of the future, therefore, will be: how are we to preserve the existence of a high standard of living among our working people of the West? Of course, we may say that time may amend this—the standard of living in the East may be brought up. In Japan, it may be brought up, to some extent; in China, it will take thousands of years."

"Australia and New Zealand, the most vulnerable points of western civilization in the Pacific littoral, have their own problems and their destiny."

"When I was in the Malay archipelago, I saw Japanese on almost every island. I was told that Australians, who had plantations, had to import Japanese as Malay labor was inefficient. One Japanese was worth half

Dr. Sawayanagi, Japan's foremost educator, arrived in San Francisco Thursday morning on board the Dollar liner President Jefferson. He had attended the first week session of the Institute of Pacific Relations at Honolulu as head of the Japanese delegation, but he was forced to leave the conference abruptly in order to proceed to the coming international educational conference to convene in Toronto, Canada.

RAY WILBUR OUTLINES IMPRESSIONS DEVELOPED AT PACIFIC INSTITUTE

Conference Chairman Avers International Machinery Is Inadequate

HONOLULU, July 30.—The Institute of Pacific Relations, in its two weeks of session, developed the impression that international machinery is woefully inadequate to deal with Pacific problems, Ray Lyman Wilbur, chairman of the conference, declared before the delegates today.

Dr. Wilbur's speech outlined the outstanding impressions developed by the conference. He declared further that there was manifested at the conference a growth of community spirit among the peoples of the Pacific despite the vast area stretching between them, and that economic interdependence of the nations of the Pacific was becoming increasingly apparent.

It proved also, he said, that old China has discovered the fountain of youth and is attempting to build up a firm government, and that the growth of the Japanese population is a problem which emigration alone cannot solve.
