Tuberculosis Cure Is Under Test

(By Ransome Sutton) Professor Emile F. Pernot, Bacteriologist of the State of Oregon, who received "The Honor of the Hague" for discovering the Avian type of tubercle bacillus, made a much more startling discovery before his death. He found a veterinary surgeon, Dr. George Kirkpatrick, a sort of a modern Pasteur, actually curing tuberculosis. "From the knowledge I gained in checking numerous cases, extending over a period of years," wrote Professor Pernot to the Mayor of Portland, "Dr. Kirkpatrick has discovered the secret of controlling the ravages of the Great White Plague, and I predict the control of other bacterial diseases."

Minseito Party Holds Monster Mass Meeting

Special to the Japanese American News TOKYO, August 1—Chiba prefecture mass meeting of the Minseito opposition party was held today in the Inohana auditorium, Chiba city. Takejiro Tokonami, chief adviser to the party, and former Premier, Reijiro Wakatsuki, appeared before the vast assemblage and delivered impressive speeches to their colleagues. The gathering was so large that the speakers were forced to repeat their orations successively on three different rostra built in the various parts of the assemblage in order that their message could be heard by everyone.

Tomorrow night (Wednesday), from 8 o'clock, they will be invited to an informal discussion at the San Francisco Japanese Y.M.C.A. Many of the perplexing problems confronting the young people will be frankly discussed, and San Francisco youths will exchange opinions on various topics with their brothers from Fresno. Young men of this city are invited to take part in this most interesting discussion group. The visiting boys are being led by President Hoshiko of the Young Men's League and Mr. Ozawa of the Fresno Japanese Association.

IMPERIAL NAVY MEN ENJOY ENTERTAINMENT AT CIVIC AUDITORIUM

S. F. Japanese Association Presents Varied Program The training squadron of the Imperial Japanese Navy was accorded the most elaborate entertainment under the auspices of the Japanese Association of San Francisco, Sunday evening, at the Civic Auditorium. Greatest gathering of Japanese audience was seen pouring into the spacious auditorium, as the Imperial Navy Band opened the formal shiki with the national Japanese anthem, "Kimi Gayo." Part one was as follows: 1. Opening address—Chairman Mr. Ichihashi. Welcome addresses by Messrs. Kanagawa, Tsutsumi, Takimoto, and Acting Consul-General Shibata. Remarks—Professor Ichihashi Response—Rear-Admiral Nagano. Star-Spangled Banner—School Girls, Municipal Band. The program of the second part featured stellar performances by Japanese and American entertainers, numbering more than fifteen acts. The grand finale was Three Cheers ("Banzai") by the entire audience.

Japan Beats Mexico, 4 to 1, in Davis Cup

Japan Takes Four Singles; Loses One Double To Mexico ST LOUIS, July 31—Having defeated Mexico, 4 to 1, in the American zone of the Davis Cup international tennis tournament, Japan will play Canada in the final American zone contest to be held in Montreal for three days, August 16, 17, 18. In the fourth match of the series played this afternoon at the Triple A Club court, between Yoshiro Ohta and Alfonso Uda, the Japanese defeated his Mexican opponent by the score of 6-1, 4-6, 6-3, 6-4. Harada of Japan defeated Bob Kinsey, playing for Mexico, in the third match of the series, 9-7, 6-0, 6-6, 6-1. In the doubles, played yesterday in the same court, the Mexican aggregation composed of Robert Kinsey and Claude Butlin defeated the Japanese team of Takeichi Harada and Zenzo Shimizu, in a close five-set match, 7-5, 6-2, 3-6, 3-6, 6-3. Kinsey is a former California star and now resident of Mexico, while Butlin is an Englishman. Both of them represented Mexico by virtue of their residence there.

ALAMEDANS TROUNCE NIPPON PREPS AT S. F. HI. FIELD, 13-2

Ogawa Twirls Good Game But Fielders Fail To Give Support Japan's prep school champion baseball team of Wakayama High School met their first Japanese opponents in America, the Alameda Taikuis. With the presentation of mementos, silver cup and banner to the visitors, the game started at 2 p.m. at the Commerce High grounds of San Francisco. Domoto and Kimura composed the Taikui battery, while the lanky Ogawa and stubby Shimamoto pitched and caught for the Wakayamans. The East Bay boys led off with a run in the first canto, adding another in the fourth frame, though they were tied by the invaders in the next inning, giving the Wakayama supporters confidence of victory. But the sixth, seventh, and eighth innings proved to be periods of mourning for the Wakayamans as the Alameda boys ran around the bases in a merry-go-round, amassing 3, 4, and 4 runs each to bring the final total up to thirteen. The swarthy little sons of Red and White swallowed the bitter pill of defeat in a good, sportsmanlike style. The Nippon players were weak in fielding due to the irregularity of the diamond.

Mayor Rolph's Reception Is Feature of Program

Officers and Men of Navy To Tour City of San Francisco Today's (Tuesday) program for the members of the Imperial training squadron now at anchor in the San Francisco harbor is as follows: From 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. will be Japanese visitors' hours on board the cruisers Iwate and Asama. From 11 a.m., a formal reception will be tendered the Japanese navy by Mayor Rolph in behalf of the city of San Francisco. Immediately following this reception, the entire body of midshipmen will tour the city, and will be served refreshments at both the Tea Garden in the Golden Gate Park and the Tea Pavilion at the Cliff House. Rear-Admiral Nagano and his officers will begin their tour from 2 p.m. In the evening, at 7 o'clock, the rear-admiral will entertain a group of prominent Americans on board the flagship Iwate. There will also be an entertainment on board the U.S.S. Pennsylvania, in honor of the naval visitors, by the American navy men.

IMPERIAL NAVY VISITS EAST BAY; BANQUET AT WHITCOMB HOTEL, S. F.

Rear-Admiral Nagano Party On Board Flagship Iwate Sunday being East Bay kengaku day, members of the Imperial training squadron, now in San Francisco harbor, spent the day as guests of the six Japanese Associations of that region. Officers and midshipmen, of the two cruisers, together with the seamen of Asama, landed at the Crowley's Wharf and from there proceeded to tour the East Bay under the guidance of prominent people from Oakland. They visited various points of interest, including the University of California, and attended a welcome banquet given in their honor by the hosts. The main event of the day's program was the big entertainment at the Civic Auditorium, which started at eight o'clock in the evening.

Mikado Leaves Hakajima On Warship Yameshiro

Special to the Japanese American News TOKYO, August 1—His Imperial Majesty, the Emperor of Japan, left Hakajima this morning on board the battleship Yameshiro which is taking part in extensive naval maneuvers. At noon, the ship passed off Nishinoshima, about 42 miles northwest of Hakajima. Nishinoshima is a group of islets without inhabitants. From there, the Yameshiro will proceed to Bungo Channel some 600 miles away. This route has never been traversed by Japanese warships before.
