Kokusai S.S. Co. To Be Divorced from Kawasaki

TOKYO, August 15—The Kokusai Steamship Company, one of the component organizations composing the K line, will be divorced from the Kawasaki dockyards and will be launched as an independent firm. The directors of the Kokusai will meet on August 18 to discuss the details of re-organization.

This new venture of the Kokusai Company in divorcing itself from the original combine was started through the temporary bankruptcy of the Kawasaki dockyards, which in turn, is the result of the recent bank panic that swept Japan last spring.

Japanese Tenor Responds To
Seven Encores

More than one thousand Japanese music lovers of San Francisco enjoyed a very delightful vocal recital by the distinguished lyric tenor, Mr. Yosie Fujiwara, at the Scottish Rite Temple on Sunday night. His rendition was greeted with great enthusiasm and was encored repeatedly. Among the encore numbers were "Okino Kamome", "Kojo no Tsuki", and "The Volga Boatman".

Part I was devoted to pieces by Salvator Rosa, Bononcini, and Scarlatti, all seventeenth century composers, while Part II contained few contemporary selections.

Part III and IV were devoted exclusively to selections by various Japanese composers.

The last, or Part V, consisted of three selections from foreign composers.

Mr. Fujiwara was accompanied on the piano by Verne Kelsey.

Before his arrival here, the tenor had an exceedingly successful tour up North. He gave recitals successively at Seattle, Tacoma, and Vancouver. At Seattle, he was accorded the biggest Japanese audience attending summer performances in fifteen years.

Mr. Fujiwara is leaving for Japan today on N.Y.K. liner Shinnyo Maru. He is engaged to play the romantic role of Osaka in the Italian opera "Iris" to be presented in Italy some time during the carnival season in March. On his present return to Japan, he is planning to acquire a set of costumes for his part in the opera, and he will come to America and from here proceed on to Europe during the latter


