JAPAN SUSPENDS POLICY OF GREATER MANCHURIAN MONGOLIAN DEVELOPMENT

Decision Is Result of Anti-Japanese Feeling and Misunderstanding

Special to the Japanese American News TOKYO, September 7.—The execution of the Government's plan for greater South Manchurian Railway Company and the strengthening of the Mongolian and Manchurian administrative control will be suspended temporarily until the anti-Japanese feeling in these regions subsides and the Chinese people gain a true understanding of the Japanese motives.

Cotton Mills To Reduce Production

Special to the Japanese American News TOKYO, September 7.—All the Japanese cotton mills in China have decided to reduce their output by 20 percent during the period extending three months from September 4. This step was taken to adjust the production with the requirements of the market.

Government Will Distribute Milk

Special to the Japanese American News TOKYO, September 7.—Agriculture Department is planning to establish a government milk supply station in each of the five largest cities of Japan, namely, Osaka, Tokyo, Kyoto, Nagoya, and Yokohama. By this method, the Government is planning upon sanitary distribution of milk for the babies of these cities.

Chester Rowell Quoted On Hawaiian Orientals

Can Orientals Americanize? Publicist Says "Yes" And "No"

Chester Rowell, author and newspaper man, who recently attended the Institute of Pacific Relations in Honolulu, makes some pertinent observations concerning the younger Japanese of our Mid-Pacific territory.

The observant publicist is quoted as follows: "Do these young Orientals become Americanized? The answer is that some of them do and some do not, and some stop half way between. Many of the young Chinese, and a probably larger number but smaller fraction of the young Japanese are as American as if their ancestors had come over in the Mayflower. All they lack is complete acceptance as such by white Americans, and they come nearer to getting that in Hawaii than anywhere else. Others are as completely Japanese as old-fashioned parents can keep them in a land where they can go to American schools. Most of them are probably between these extremes.

"Will they be 'good Americans' in the political sense when they come to vote, and a few years hence to be the majority of the voters, as they now are of the school children?"

OPINIONS DIFFER IN HAWAII

"There are two opinions in Hawaii, but most of those of practical experience in politics would answer 'yes'. There is fear on the part of some who believe that the only safe voter is the one who votes as they tell him, that the Japanese may be too 'independent'. The native Hawaiian race, who are the majority of the present voters, have always been docile, and white leaders know how to deal with them. The Japanese, obviously, are a less tractable people. But the active politicians profess not to fear them. They will be loyal to America, they say, and interested in the good of Hawaii. However, it will be noted that few of these politicians are advocating statehood for the islands."

JAPANESE POETRY, ART, AND DRAMA DISCUSSED AT INTERNATIONAL CLUB

What may be termed an "adventure in international understanding" was conducted Tuesday night in the form of a "Japan Night" by the International Club at its headquarters on 1860 Washington street, San Francisco.

About thirty people from many lands gathered to enjoy the interesting program prepared by the Japanese group of the Club. Miss Sumie Yamamoto, secretary of the local Y.W.C.A., acted as chairman and introduced the first speaker, Iwao Kawakami, of Berkeley, who gave a brief and concise talk on the "Poetry of Japan". He outlined the various forms of Japanese poetry with example taken from the major poets of Japan.

The next speaker was Mr. Kay Nishida of this city who gave an outline history of Japanese art. Mr. David Yamakawa next contributed to the program with an accomplished reading of "Chyushingura", or the deeds of the famous Forty Ronins of Genroku Age of the Tokugawa Shogunate. His interpretive reading of that highly dramatic historical play impressed the audience, and he received considerable comments for his efforts.

The rest of the evening was devoted to informal discussion and friendly "get-together", while tea and refreshments were served. The next meeting of the Club will be held at the home of Mrs. Osawa, 719 Ashbury street, on Tuesday night, September 20, from eight o'clock. Mr. Torao Kawasaki of the local Consulate-General will speak on the philosophy of Japanese art. He has just returned from a lecture tour of the various universities in the East, and his talk before the international group at the next meeting is eagerly anticipated by the members.

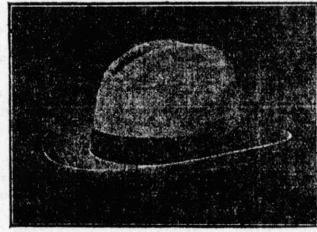
