JAPAN AND CHINA

There is little doubt that the relations between China and Japan, which have not been of the best since the Sino-Japanese war and which were at their worst some seven or eight years ago, are steadily improving.

In fact, never have the two peoples been on more friendly terms than they are today.

Quite naturally there is a reason for this change. It is merely that Japan, victorious in her wars with China and Russia, believed herself superior to any Oriental nation in all things. She had developed a superiority complex and it was only in very recent years that she discovered her fault. Fortunately, on making this discovery, Japan has not been slow in making amends.

This important discovery was that while she without doubt is the most powerful nation in the Far East in matters pertaining to warfare, she ranks very, very far below China in matters of business. On every commercial transaction she has entered with China, as a nation or as individuals, Japan and its people have been put to shame, and no amount of gun-powder has ever will alter this fact.

With the discovery that she was not the superior of China in all things came to Japan the realization that she must treat China as an equal. This has been the policy that Nippon has pursued during the past half a dozen years, with most satisfactory results.

The Japanese are quick to realize their shortcomings. The late Premier Komei Kato was no exception to this rule. It was he, we remember, who occupied the Foreign Ministership when Japan dispatched her infamous Twenty-One Demands to China. And it was he who, on discovering his and the nation's error, hastened to make amends when he attained the premiership.

Japan's policy towards China, in fact, has never been so sanely followed as during the tenure of office of Komei Kato who, with the able assistance of Viscount Shidehara, has done as much as anyone else to re-establish the friendly relations between the two countries.

It is our sincere hope that the present government as well as the governments to follow will continue to follow the example set by Kato.

PLANE HITS 3 CHILDREN IN MISHAP

700 Endangered in Playground Crash

Special to the Japanese American News TOKYO, October 21.—Three children were seriously injured, and the lives of 700 others endangered today when the pilot of an army plane attempted a landing on an open space at Atago, Shiba-ura, near Shiba Park, where several hundred school children were participating in games. One of the injured children is in a critical condition.

According to the pilot his plane developed engine trouble, forcing him to descend. When about fifteen meters from the ground he managed to get the machine under control again but by this time he was almost directly above the children's play ground which will be the star forward of Placer. The wind from the propeller swept a number of the youngsters off their feet, while articles which were either thrown, or fell from the plane struck three of the pupils, knocking them senseless. The injured students were rushed to a near-by hospital.

The police and army officials are conducting an investigation.

Zoo in Tokyo To Be Modernized

Special to the Japanese American News TOKYO, Oct. 21.—One hundred and ninety thousand yen has been appropriated by the City for the improvement of the Zoological gardens at Ueno, which will be completely modernized according to American plans. It is expected this work will take at least three years.

Goto Expects To Visit America

TOKYO, October 21.—Viscount Shimpel Goto, noted Japanese liberal and former mayor of Tokyo, who leaves here shortly for Russia to attend the forthcoming celebration at Moscow of the tenth anniversary of the Russian revolution, will visit the United States following his tour of Europe, it was learned today. Goto expects to depart for Moscow November 11.

Economic Expert To Tour World

TOKYO, October 21.—F. Kuhara, head of the Japanese economic commission, will leave Tokyo Station tomorrow evening on an investigation tour of the world. He will be accompanied by the Japanese consul to New York who is now here, and a number of other officials.
