DOLLS FROM JAPAN

In return for the several hundred blue-eyed dolls of friendship sent to Japan as messengers of good-will by children in American schools, the Tenyo Maru which arrives here November 23 will bring 58 dark-eyed dolls from Nippon.

These dolls will be clothed in the most gorgeous kimono that San Francisco will see for a long time. They will each have a set of perfectly matched eyes, teeth, hands and feet, and they will be about the cutest things ever to be seen.

An opportunity will be given all second generation Japanese here to see the dolls, and we hope every young man and woman in this city will make it a point to greet these messengers of peace. It will acquaint them with the best side of Japan. It will show them how the best people of Nippon bring up their daughters. It will show them what true Japan is.

Among the 58 dolls, there will be one from Princess Teru, daughter of T.I.M. the Emperor and Empress. Miss Osaka and Miss Naniwa will also be included in the delegation of fair maidens.

Miss Osaka will be attired in an elaborate kimono of silk crepe (kohama), with flowing sleeves. Her gown will be embroidered in gold and silver, while her "obi" or sash will be a true work of art. Her teeth will be of ivory, and she will bring with her all articles that accompany a Japanese bride to her new home, such as a bureau, "hari bako" or needle box, "koto," playthings, and other articles.

All of the dolls will bear letters from Japanese primary school children to the children in America. These dolls, it should be mentioned, will not be the cheap things one sees in local shops. They will be about the most expensive Japanese dolls manufactured, and we can, with pride we feel, point them out to Americans here as dolls representative of the best there is in Japan.

These dolls will be placed on display at Golden Gate Institute sometime late next month. We hope all readers of the Japanese American News will go to see them.

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JAPANESE SHOT IN HOLD-UP**Parlier Resident Is In Serious Condition**
