Special to the Japanese American News TOKYO, October 20—Devouring live caterpillars, spiders, centipedes and other insects in the presence of Dr. Saeki, noted nutrition expert...

Dr. Saeki is head of the Government Nutrition Bureau, one of the greatest institutions of its kind in the world.

Jacques Loeb has shown us that frogs could be "manufactured." He has developed a number of these creatures who had no father but a fatty acid, and he holds that artificial production of living beings from lifeless matter might some time be achieved in the laboratory.

JAPANESE PRESS ON JUNE GOTO

Former L. A. Girl Engaged By Doshisha

Los Angeles — Much favorable publicity has been given lately in Japan to June Goto, former student of the University of California.

The Japan Times, which is the largest English newspaper in Japan, gives a prominent mention of her and of the Doshisha University's latest venture in international teaching fellowships to be filled by American-born Japanese.

June Goto, 22, of California, and Raymond Kakuchi Oshima, 28, of Hawaii, were the first two applicants to be honored with the position by the Doshishi University.

Here in California special interest is attached to Miss June Goto, as she has been a prominent member of the younger group in both Berkeley and Los Angeles.

The Japan Times of Tokyo contains the following outline of her life in one of its recent editions: "Miss June Goto is now at Doshisha under the fellowship described above, was born February 10, 1905, in Salinas, California, in the county of Monterey, of Japanese parentage.

Two years later June Goto entered the local grammar school at the age of seven years and seven months in September 1912 and graduated in February 1919 at the age of 14 years.

"In the same month she entered Glendale Union High School and graduated in June, 1922 at 17 years of age. Throughout her high school years she took great interest in English literature, especially in the composition of fiction.

"After graduating from high school, she sought to continue her work in English literature. She entered the University of California at Los Angeles in September 1922 and received her Bachelor's (B. A.) degree in June 1926 at the age of 21 years.

"Originally she had planned to accept the position at the Doshishi University in Kyoto, Japan, soon after graduation. But she decided that her preparation was still incomplete, so she went to Berkeley, California, and there, while studying English literature at the University of California, lived with an American family and became intimately acquainted with American home-life.

He is expected to do his research work under the direction of Professor Cottrell, the head of the department, and investigate administrative systems of various countries.

The scholar came to this country several years ago from Japan to be educated in American schools, and though handicapped in English, he has made a brilliant scholarship record, having completed the four-year high school course in less than two years and the university course in three years and half.

Beside acting as an assistant, he is studying for the degree of Master of Arts.

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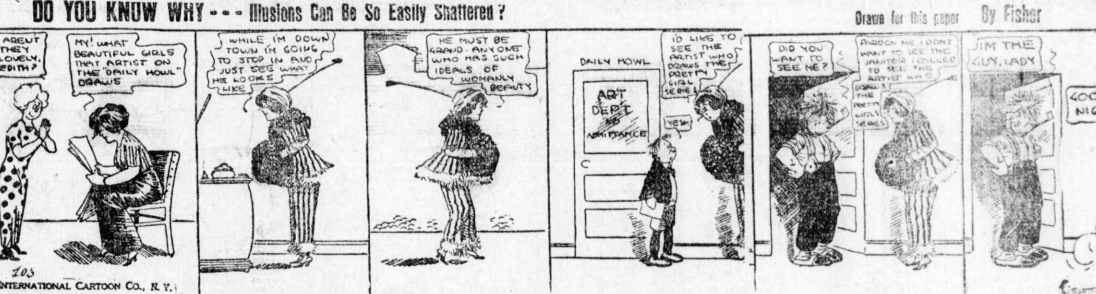
