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BUSINESS IN JAPAN

Perhaps the most unbusinesslike country in the world is Japan. We are famous, or infamous rather, for our atrocious business methods, and in this respect we are ages behind our next-door neighbors, the Chinese.

No business dealings are entered into, nor understandings reached and agreements concluded in Nippon, excepting through drinking in the presence of questionable women.

No sooner is a work of public interest undertaken than graft and corruption come in its train. Politicians, statesmen occupying high positions in the government, and most of the legislators of the houses of Parliament, discuss their important affairs of state in "tea" houses where "saké" and "getsha" girls are ever present.

In the papers you frequently no doubt read of the Premier and his Cabinet having discussed some important state matter at one or another tea house.

And what is really to be regretted is that almost no effort is being made to put an end to this sad state of affairs.

CHIANG BOUND FOR SHANGHAI

Noted Nationalist Will Not Make World Tour

TOKYO, November 8.—General Chiang Kai-shek, noted Chinese Nationalist leader who has been in this country for the past few weeks, left Kobe today quietly for Shanghai aboard the N. Y. K. line's Nagasaki Maru.

While the purpose of the general's departure is not known, it is believed in well-informed circles here that he has either succeeded in receiving financial aid in this country, or has been assured of support from Nationalist supporters in the Chinese port city.

Chiang, it will be understood, escaped from China recently following the Nationalist debacle. He intended to spend a few weeks in Japan before proceeding on a tour of the world. During his stay in Japan he has called on a number of prominent Japanese statesmen and business executives.
