TSURUMI HERE ON BRIEF VISIT

Liberal Predicts Downfall Of Tanaka

Yusuke Tsunami, noted Japanese liberal leader and one of the most eloquent speakers of Nippon, arrived in San Francisco yesterday aboard the Dollar liner President Taft on a three months' visit to this country...

Seen yesterday morning aboard the Taft, Tsunami predicted the downfall of the present Japanese government sometime late next January.

"As Tanaka is famous for his weakness on the platform, especially in the face of strong opposition, it is very likely that the Government will not be able to remain in power through the Diet session. It will, I believe, dissolve the Diet some time late in January, with the possibility of the holding of a general election in March."

It is at the general elections that will follow the dissolution of the Japanese parliament, that Tsunami expects to appear as a candidate for power as one of the leaders of the newly formed New Liberal Party.

This new party, according to Tsunami, will have the casting vote at the next general election. The Seiyukai and Minseitō each have some 200 votes while the Kakushin Club and other minor political factions each command from ten to twenty votes.

Tsunami, who is staying at the Fairmont Hotel, will remain here until Saturday evening when he leaves for Wichita to deliver his first lecture. The subjects of his speeches while in America will be: "Japan's Policies Toward Russia and China," and "Japanese Political Fermentation Resulting from Universal Suffrage."

A son-in-law of Viscount Shimpei Goto, former Minister of Foreign Affairs, Tsunami aroused great interest in 1924 when at the Institute of Politics at Williamstown and later at the Institute of Pacific Relations, he reviewed the Japanese stand on the immigration question.

JAPANESE STAR ON BROADWAY

Dancer Will Shine In Musical Comedy

TOKYO—Japan will contribute a share of the program for the fall opening of the Winter Garden of New York, known as one of the leading amusement houses in the world, when Aida Kawakami, well known Japanese dancer, will appear in a number of the musical comedy "Artists and Models."

Touring the Pacific Coast in America under contract with the West Coast Theatres circuit last summer, Miss Kawakami enjoyed an unparalleled popularity for an Oriental dancer. She gave performances in the leading theatres of the Coast, including the Warfield Theatre in San Francisco where she gave her interpretation of the "Dance of Solome." She was also seen in Los Angeles, Sacramento, Portland, Seattle, and other big centers.

Miss Kawakami, the foster child of Captain S. Miyata, director of the Kaiyosha Company, was reared in Shanghai. She has been dancing in the United States since last year.

The period of the privilege accorded to her as an artist to remain in the United States having recently expired she was going to leave New York for Japan. The privilege was, however, extended by the Immigration Authorities at Washington, as the result of representations made by the Shubert organization, managers of the Winter Garden, to enable Miss Kawakami to fill her engagement in "Artists and Models."

NOVELIST CONCLUDES CONTRACT

K. Nakagawa Signs Contract With Publisher

SACRAMENTO—Karl S. Nakagawa, first second-generation novelist, has just received word from the publisher of his new mystery romance "The Rendezvous of Mysteries" that the first edition of the book will include 25,000 copies and that the company is expecting to dispose of 75,000 copies of Nakagawa's work.

The boy novelist is also in possession of a contract with his publisher, The Dorrance and Company, Inc., of Philadelphia, giving the publisher the right to all work of Nakagawa for the next five years. By this contract the Japanese writer enjoys very favorable terms for his future output in literary writing, and he expects shortly to begin upon another novel.

"The Rendezvous of Mysteries," which will be published in the early part of next year, will contain 295 pages, divided into 35 chapters, and it will be on sale by the leading book stores in the United States at \$2.00 per copy. Nakagawa was born in Japan, but he arrived in this country when he was yet a child; consequently he may be regarded as one of the second-generation group. He attended the Sacramento High School for two years. His address is P. O. Box 203, Broderick, California.

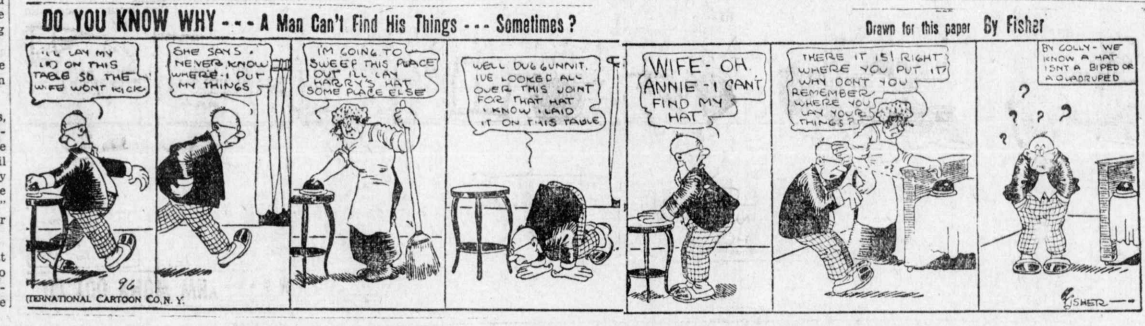
