JAPANESE ARE GIVEN GOOD PAY

Chicago Employees Receive From \$200-\$300

With the express purpose of alleviating the so-called second-generation vocational problem, the local Japanese Association has been conducting a thorough investigation of employment conditions for Japanese young people throughout the United States.

The report from Chicago, as just announced by the local Association, reveals optimistic prospects of employment at comfortable salaries. Here is the list of number of Japanese employed in the more artistic vocations, together with their financial remunerations:

WOMEN:—Two women employed in retouching photographs receive from \$200 to \$250 per month. Four women engaged in embroidery work receive \$100 to \$150. MEN:—3 Electricians \$200 to \$250; 4 Machinists \$200 to \$250; 6 Cabinet Makers \$200 to \$300; 3 Commercial Artists \$150 to \$200; 1 Penmanship Expert \$275; 4 Photographers \$200 to \$350.

Japan has made remarkable progress in reconstructing its Capital and other districts devastated at the time of the earthquake of 1923. Her business has been placed on a firmer foundation. She is rapidly adopting herself to the ways of the West and has definitely established herself as one of the great Powers of the world.

And this she has done under very adverse conditions—conditions under which few countries in the world today, in our opinion, could have regained their former prestige. The spirit and the courage of the "bushi" of old still exists in the heart of young Japan, and as long as this spirit and courage live Nippon will forge ahead in the face of any and all odds.

Suiheisha Sends Appeal to Throne

TOKYO, Nov. 22—Police today lifted the publication ban on the "grave incident" which took place at Nagoya on November 19 as the Emperor reviewed his troops.

According to the official report of the incident, Private T. Kitahara, 22, of the 64th Regiment, rushed before His Majesty as the Emperor reviewed his troops, and made an attempt to present a message to the Throne.

The note was attached to the bayonet of Kitahara's rifle. The private, according to the official report, rushed directly in front of the Emperor, then knelt and made an effort to present the note. He was immediately put under military arrest.

The letter to the Throne, it was announced, contained a request that the discriminatory treatment of Suiheisha, or social outcasts, in the regiment be put an end to. Private Kitahara is chairman of the City Suiheisha's Executive Committee. Police suspect him of having been influenced by anarchists.

This is the second letter of appeal to the Throne that has been tendered to His Majesty in the past two months. In the previous case a woman fanatic made an attempt to deliver a message to the Emperor in an effort to have the condition of the women of the country improved.

Hamaguchi Hits Government

TOKYO, Nov. 22—Yuko Hamaguchi, president of the Minseitō party, today severely attacked the Government's China policy, its conduct of the recent pre-arranged elections, and its inability to alleviate the financial depression, at a mass meeting of the Minseitō held at Nakanoshima, Osaka.

SHIP AFIRE REACHES YOKOHAMA

Firemen Come To Aid of British Freighter

Special to the Japanese American News TOKYO, Nov. 22—Steaming full speed into Yokohama with its cargo of cotton on fire, the British freighter City of Madras, 5,400 tons, arrived off the No. 3 old customs pier at 1:10 a.m. today.

Harbor police and firemen were rushed to the aid of the burning liner and are working frantically to extinguish the flames.

The City of Madras is from Houston, Texas. Fire was discovered in its holds late last night while the vessel was off the 99-r pier. Unable to extinguish the flames without the aid of better fire fighting equipment, the captain made full speed for Yokohama, entering that port shortly after midnight with the ship in flames.

Placer County Five Will Invade S. F.

Elated over last Saturday's victory over the Stockton Y. M. B. A. quintet, the Placer County Y. M. A. basketball team will invade San Francisco and East Bay for series of two games during the Thanksgiving holidays.

The Placer County boys will clash with the local Japanese Y. M. C. A. varsity this Thursday afternoon, from three o'clock, at the Salvation Army court, 155 Valencia street. Admission will be thirty five cents for adults; 25 cents for children. The game should be an exciting one, as both teams are strong and evenly matched. While in San Francisco the Northerners will stay at the Aki Hotel on Post street.

The other game for the Y. M. A.'s will be played across the bay, against the strong O. D. S. five, which defeated the Protons of this city Saturday by 19 to 5.

FRESNO IN JAPANESE ORATORICAL

AMERICAN PAPER LAUDS SPEAKERS AT LAST CONTEST

FRESNO—The second of a series of two oratorical contests being sponsored by the four Japanese Associations of Central California will be conducted in Japanese on Saturday evening, December 10. The date had been set previously at December 3, but due to requests for more time in which to prepare the Japanese orations the date of the contest was postponed for one week. All those young speakers who are planning to participate in the contest but who are yet hesitating to make the applications should do so at once to the Japanese Association of this city.

The coming contest is the second of a series of two. The first one was held last Saturday evening, and Kazumi Hanada of Diruba, speaking on the subject of "Value of Education," won first place. The contest was conducted in English.

One of the local American papers, commenting upon Saturday's English contest declared:

"The speakers dwell upon the essential need for the second generation of Japanese in America being loyal to America, being law-abiding citizens, studying the ballot and serving the land of their birth industrially and wholeheartedly while at the same time revering the land of their parents and striving to improve the relationship between the two countries. There was a sincere unanimity of expression from the six speakers on this subject, the three winners stressing it more generously than did the other three.

"In making the announcement Mr. Haight in behalf of the judges complimented the speakers very highly and the Japanese associations which sponsored the contest and presented the awards. He also urged that the contest next year be again held in Visalia and that it be given wider publicity to the end that more Americans might know of it and attend."

OAK PARK GIRLS PLAN TOUR HERE

Gakuen Members To Welcome Nippon Dolls

SACRAMENTO—Twelve little Japanese maids of Oak Park Gakuen, led by Rev. Muraoka of Sacramento, will journey to San Francisco for a kongaku trip and to welcome the friendship dolls from Japan, which are headed by princess Nippon, the gift of Princess Teru to the children of America.

These friendship dolls will arrive in San Francisco this Friday on board the N. Y. K. liner Tenyo Maru. "Princess Nippon" will have a retinue of 57 maids-in-waiting, and they will be "officially received" by Mayor Rolph, after which they will be on display at the City Hall for three days. These dolls, which are the expression of appreciation of the 15,000 friendship dolls sent to Japan early this year by American children, will be tendered an appropriate welcome at the Fairmont Hotel on Thursday, December 1. They will also be on exhibit at the local Kinmon Gakuen Hall prior to their departure for East.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY—Out of a list of seventy students who will receive their degrees from the University of Stanford next January, one Japanese is included. Kazuo Kawai, second generation student from Los Angeles, will receive his degree of Master of Arts. He is majoring in history.

The seventy candidates for degrees next January, as listed by registrar J. P. Mitchell, include thirty-one students for baccalaureate degrees and the remaining ones for advanced degrees.

Other numbers for the evening's program include trumpet solo by Kenji Shikuma, violin solo by Steve Umino, piano solo by Helen Matsuda, and a short story recital by I. Motoki. H. K. Sakata, superintendent of the Sunday School, will give a little talk to the young people.

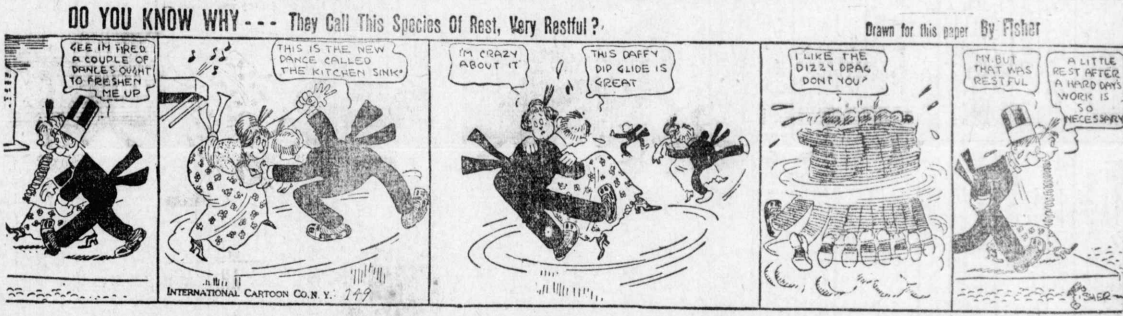
