CALIFORNIA AND THE PHILIPPINES

The Federation of Labor of the state of California recently formally recommended that the Philippines be granted their independence.

There is, of course, little doubt regarding the motive of the local federation in prompting it to take this action. The resolution urges the United States Congress to place the same restrictions upon the immigration of Filipino laborers as is applied to other Asiatics, and that the islands be immediately granted their independence.

In discussing this question the Japan Times says:

American Labor does not want the Philippines, and it is quite ready to sacrifice this doubtful imperial asset for the secure and solid advantage of a market, always expanding, closed to alien labor, and it can only be effectively closed, as shown in the resolution, by treating all Asiatic nations alike.

Its views of a threatened Chinese influx are pliant, to say the least. The great nation across the Yellow sea, apparently, would not send any other of its myriad people, nor would any be expected, at least by the Federation of Labor, than "2000 coolies." Will the time never come when western nations will see that China has valuable human material to exchange, and by extension of reasoning other Oriental nations also?

To give the Philippines its freedom in order the better to check the influx of Oriental labor is a point of view that will surely tickle the humor of Diplomacy. If Diplomacy is possessed of humor, it is Labor's solution of an international problem, a new orientation of policy which, generally acted upon would place Labor indeed upon the throne. The Californian "workers" must try again.

Japan Opposes Soviet's Move

TOKYO, Dec. 3.—The Soviet Government's recent proposal at the Geneva conference that all nations of the world disarm totally, is being received here with more contempt than seriousness. The people of the Empire as a whole are inclined to oppose the proposal.

Officials of the army express the opinion that the Soviet government is in no position to make overtures to the world with regard to disarmament. It should first, these officials say, propose the ending of espionage.

Following the fracas members of both factions fled suit for damages.


