OUT-BOLSHEVIZING RUSSIA

The Associated Press this (Tuesday) morning reports a new general red revolt in South China, with Canton completely in control of communists and other southern cities threatened.

The United States ground Sacramento has landed men and field guns at Canton to protect foreigners, while the other American gunboats are standing by.

Refugees report looting and pillage in Canton, while reports from Hankow state that outlying districts are completely communistic, with peasants murdering wealthy landlords.

The moderate Nationalist government at Nanking has been denounced by Communists in violent posters in Hankow with indications that the Nationalist commander there might switch to the Communists.

This, as all who are following the situation in China must agree, is out-Bolshevizing the Bolsheviks. Our readers will recall that in July this year the Nationalist Government deported M. Borodin, Galen, Eugene Chen and other communists who started the Bolshevism reign in China.

PEOPLE TO VIEW TAMA MAUSOLEUM

Coronation Budget Passed By Cabinet

Special to the Japanese American News TOKYO, Dec. 13—The Tama Mausoleum in which the remains of the late Emperor Taisho were placed at rest early this year, will be opened to the public for the first seven days of next year, it was announced today by the Imperial Household Department.

The Railway Department will place special trains on the service from the Capital to Asakawa, and it is expected that a large number of citizens will take advantage of the generous offer of the Imperial Household Department and will pay their respects to the late ruler.

3 CHINESE FLEE FROM S. S. KOREA

N. Y. K. Liner Crew Make Escape Sunday

Conspiring together to make a get-away, three Chinese bell-boys of the N. Y. K. liner Korea Maru which was at anchor at Pier 34 watched for a good opportunity to accomplish their purpose, and during the commotion prior to fumigation of the ship about nine o'clock Sunday morning they fled toward South Park and have not since been found by the authorities.

The three fugitives are Kishun (26) and Hobun (25), who were both employed for first-class passenger duties, and Ekisel (24), who was in the second-class passenger department. Their escape was effected through the entire non-officer crew of the ship was being led from the ship to the N.Y.K. storehouse across the railway line by their superiors in order to accommodate them while the Korea Maru was being disinfected. As the Chinese youths fled for liberty, the officers pursued them, but due to intricacies of the streets in that section the fugitives made a safe get-away. It is believed that they had some skillfully arranged connections with fellow Chinese conspirators in this city who aided them in their escape.

As a consequence of their escape the Nippon Yusen Kaisha will be responsible for \$1000 penalty for each one of the fugitives, imposed by the U. S. Immigration office. This is the second case of crew desertion experienced by the N. Y. K. line recently. The other involved the disappearance of a certain Japanese of the culinary department of the Tenyo Maru. His name is being withheld by the authorities. Because of the frequent recurrences of these violations of immigration provisions forbidding illegal entries by aliens by escape from ship, the authorities are taking extreme vigilance in the matter. During the late T.K.K. administration such cases of ship desertion was extremely rare due to the fact that the officers of the ships were very strict in their vigilance, but of late, ever since the N.Y.K. regime, watch has been relaxed somewhat due to the persistent demands made by the crew for "personal rights" and too rigid surveillance was resented and protested.
