## MOTION PICTURES IN JAPAN

Japan produces more motion pictures today than any country in the world except the United States.

During the last 12 months more than 3500 photoplays of feature length were released in Nippon, an average of about 10 a day, not including comedies and news reels.

This because motion pictures are today by far and away the most popular national amusement in Japan. In one Tokio park alone there are more than 50 theaters, as many, perhaps, as there are in the entire City of San Francisco.

And these theaters are jammed to the rafters, as the police of this country would permit no local house to be. On Sundays and holidays the theaters are so overcrowded that it is not uncommon for patrons to be carried out unconscious. The "Standing Room Only" signs are up from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m.

The surprising thing about this is that the popularity of motion pictures grows despite everything imaginable that is done to discourage interest in the amusement.

The censors clip too fervid love scenes and ban photoplays of revolutions and the overthrowing of a crowned ruler. Blood in no form can be shown on the screen.

## Three Sections

The police have divided playhouses into three sections, one for men, another for women and a third for married couples, to keep the sexes apart. Public school teachers do all in their power to dissuade children from going to the movies. Girls' high schools forbid students from patronizing motion picture houses.

But the popularity of the movies grows.

The majority of Japanese pictures end unhappily, but this is regarded by the Japanese as a "happy ending." A Japanese fan will no more stand for a happy ending in the Western sense of the word in a native production than an American will tolerate a sad ending.

The most popular and conventional ending is that the two lovers leaping into the bottomless pit of a waterfall, or the crater of a volcano, "to live happily ever afterward" in the next world.

## U. S. Stars Popular

While the majority of pictures exhibited in Japan are native productions, American photoplays are the most popular, and Gloria Swanson, John Gilbert and Greta Garbo are just as well known in Tokio as they are here.

## JAPANESE BISHOP TO ARRIVE N.Y.

## Plans To Visit Three Main Cities Of Coast

NEY YORK, Jan. 27—Prominent clergymen and laymen, both American and Japanese, are laying extensive plans to welcome the Right Reverend Jennaro Hayasaka, first Japanese bishop, who will arrive in this port on February 17 from Havre aboard the steamer Declassé.

From New York Bishop Hayasaka will go to Washington to visit the Apostolic delegate and to meet the Japanese Ambassador. He will not make an extended visit of this country, but Americans and Japanese Catholics along the line of his travel are expected to extend welcome to him.

According to informations from the headquarters of the Catholic Church of New York, the Japanese communities on the Pacific Coast are anticipating the opportunity to greet the Japanese bishop, and in all probabilities he will visit Los Angeles, San Francisco, and Seattle.

Reverend Jennaro Hayasaka, who is a graduate of the Sendai Daini Gakko, was consecrated at Rome by Pope Pius XI on October 30 of last year.
