**GIRLS SPORTS IN JAPAN**  
The mainstay of the Japanese team at the forthcoming Olympic games at Amsterdam will be a woman. She is Miss Kinie Hitomi, first all-round woman champion of Nippon.

The fact that Miss Hitomi will be one of Japan's representatives at the Olympic games means a great deal to the advancement of sports in Nippon. It gives added impetus to the development of athletics among the women, which, to say the very least, is a prerequisite.

Writing in *Josel*, Miss Hitomi has the following to say regarding the restrictions placed on women's sports by the Department of Education:

We're boys in middle schools, no matter how much the Educational Department restricted us, there would be plenty of other meets to enter, as well as plenty of other fields to take part in, but what are the girls to do when they are prohibited from taking part in the only meet that can be called a girls' meet with any authority? Why do not the authorities at the Educational Department think and act more for the development of Women's sports? Why do not they open up a path upon which we may tread?

But grumbling aside, we cannot look on in silence and inactivity. How can the warm blood which throbs in the hearts of the young women of Japan today bear to be restrained and bullied any longer? The Olympic Games

From America, England, France, Germany, and many other lands, women athletes will come. And with this in mind, can we young women of Japan look on in silence and be beaten? And with the coming year, it is my sincerest wish and prayer that as many girls as possible will be able to go across the seas to Holland, and in the name of the Land of the Rising Sun, show the world what we are doing here!

## Plans For Mock Diet Meeting Are Completed

PROMINENT MEN ORGANIZE MODEL SEIYUKAI CABINET

With the selection of Consul General Morikazu Ida as Premier, the organization of the cabinet and the three major political parties have been completed for the coming model parliament meeting to be sponsored by the leading Japanese residents of this city at the Reformed Church on Post street on Saturday evening, February 11, from 7:28 o'clock.

Much interest is being shown over this mock Diet session, which will be modelled after the Japanese Imperial Diet, and the fact that Japan is at present in a great political turmoil due to the operation for the first time of the universal manhood suffrage will add to the interest of the local meeting where the identical questions debated in Japan will be discussed.

The main Opposition party, the Minseito, has engaged the Kashu Hotel on Sutter street as its headquarters, and the party is being led by Tsukamoto, with S. Nagata as the chief of staff. The third party, to be known as the Social Labor, will operate from the office of the local Japanese Labor Union. T. Takimoto is head of this party.

## Parties Expected to Spend Huge Sum


TOKYO, Feb. 3—A total of 100,000 yen will be spent by the various political parties during the forthcoming general elections, it is reported.

## JAPANESE ART WORK ON EXHIBIT

Students View Art Works By Girls Of Japan

The seventy six paintings and drawings sent to the public schools of this city by the students of the Tomioka Girls' High School as an expression of good will from Japan are now on exhibit at the three high schools of this city, namely, the Polytechnic, the Galileo, and the Girls High.

These art works were distributed through the efforts of Hatake, head of the Educational Department of the local Japanese Association, in conjunction with Miss Hall, art instructor of Polytechnic High. The latter is now sponsoring a move to reciprocate the courtesies of the Japanese girls and send to Japan a group of paintings and drawings by American students and thus help establish firmer and better relations between the two groups of students who are the future citizens of their respective countries.

Under present plans these art works will be ready by the end of this month for shipment to Japan.

The group of drawings and paintings from Tomioka school shows much artistic talent, particularly the design works, which are very delicately drawn and colored. Another group of noteworthy works are the oil paintings, which mostly portray Japan's beautiful scenic views.
