PILOT PLANS FLYING TRIP IN NIPPON

Australia Included In Sojourn of Dole Flier

Unofficial good will flier from the United States will arrive in Nippon for a series of flights there, if no mishap detain Colonel Arthur C. Goebel, winner of the Dole Hawaiian air derby last summer, who arrived at Mills Field from Los Angeles Sunday for his trip to the land of the cherry blossoms.

The flier was greeted at Mills Field by members of the Pacific Aero Club, city officials and army and navy officers.

With Goebel was Ernest Robinson, vice-president of the Fairchild Aviation Company of New York, owner of their monoplane. Next Thursday, with the plane crated, Goebel and Robinson will leave for Japan to give demonstrations to aviation officials. They also plan a tour of the Philippines and Australia.

HOOVER FOR PRESIDENT

5,000 STRIKERS IN CHIBA ARE IN PITIABLE CONDITION

200 Stores Closed, 500 Students Are Forced To Work as Deadlock Continues 6 Months

TOKYO, March 12—Conditions in Noda-machi, Chiba Prefecture, where the powerful Noda Soy interests maintain their headquarters, and in which a strike has been waged by more than 5,000 workers in the Noda Soy factories for the past six months, are declared to be the most pitiful witnessed in that district in many years.

The continued refusal of either side to agree to a compromise has led in the closing up of more than 200 stores, while 350 school students have been forced to remain at home to assist their parents in obtaining a livelihood.

Washington U Student Wins Phi Beta Key

SEATTLE, Wash., March 12.—The highest scholastic honor attainable by a university student was won by Taduo Kimura, when he was elected to membership of the Phi Beta Kappa. The announcement was made last week by the University of Washington officials.

Kimura is the second Japanese student to obtain a Phi Beta Kappa key in the state of Washington. The first was Ray Otaka, who is residing in Japan at the present time. Taduo is genuine native of Seattle and a graduate of the Franklin High School, where he was the valedictorian for the class of 1924. At present he is majoring in language in the College of Liberal Arts.

Fresno Man Files 35,000-Dollar Suit

LOS ANGELES, March 12—Representatives of six gakuen near here met recently to formulate plans for a combined athletic meet on the 14th of next month at the Gardena Gakuen fields.

The meet will be sponsored by the Compton, Gardena, El Segundo, Moneta, and Keystone gakuen under the following regulations:

1. Five points will be given to the first places, 3 to second, and 1 to third, in the various events.

2. The expenses of the meet will be borne by each of the six gakuen, which are requested to pay their allotment of \$25 by the 25th of this month to Mr. Endo of Compton gakuen.

3. The preparations of the field and the clean-up after the meet will be taken care of by members of the Gardena and Compton gakuen.

Bears Take 33-10 Drubbing In Cage War

In the most significant cage tryst of the season, the local Showa athletic hoopers downed the mighty Golden Bears from the Berkeley Japanese camp on Euclid Avenue last Saturday evening at the Park gymnasium by an unexpected walkaway of 33-10 score.

If strict training and a stiff workout throughout the season meant anything at all, the game last Saturday night showed it. The San Francisco Post street athletes never fought as hard in all their life, so it seemed as each player sped across the floor in a break-neck speed, not mentioning of their tenacious guarding.

While down on the California farm, the hibernating Bears took things too much for granted. This was evidenced by the short-winded players, whose limbs could not stand throughout the game and gave the Showans their easy chance to score. No team ever developed a fighting combination in a week, and the learned proteges of Berkeley Hills should have known it.

From the tip-off of the starting whistle, the California Bears went into the fray with wonder form and chalked up a 7-2 lead within the first three or four minutes of play. Showans took time out to swear a vow of victory. Perhaps this was the most dramatic moment of the entire evening; while the howling mob of Cardinal supporters on the southern bench strained their vocal cords to spur the Showa warriors to fight.

The program changed hands from that drama, and the Post streeters piled up score in leaps and bounds. At half-time rest, they were quite assured of a neat victory. Piggy Moriyama, right guard for the Berkeley boys, was the only lone hero of the night who sank the remaining three points to inflate the score to an even 10 mark. Toby Ogawa was another high pointer for the Californians, and both made up the nucleus of the Bear team.

Stunts came next. Remarkably well-prepared and well-enacted acts made it rather difficult for the judges to choose the best two. After much deliberation, Cortez, with her stunt, "Were in the Army Now," won 1st place which brought a prize of an almost realistic wriggly toy snake. Fresno C. E. came second with the funny parody on "Romeo and Juliet".
