## JAPANESE OCEAN HOP PLANS TOLD

Flight To Be Made From Hokkaido To Seattle

TOKYO, March 26.—The plane to be used in Japan's forthcoming trans-Pacific flight this autumn will be completed in July, it was announced today simultaneously with the issuing of details regarding the venture.

The hop-off will be made from Hokkaido, and not from Tokorozawa near Tokyo, due to the fact that a saving of 1,000 kilometers will thus be effected.

From Hanasaki the plane will fly over the Aleutians and on to Seattle. The flight will be made early in September.

**Japan Launches 3rd Cruiser in 1924 Program**

TOKYO, March 24.—Japan's third 10,000-ton cruiser, the *Haguro*, was launched at Nagasaki today.

The *Haguro* is one of the first class cruisers provided for under the 1923 and 1924 naval programs. Two were commissioned in 1927, the *Nachi* and *Myoko*. The ships carry ten 8-inch guns, four 4.7 anti-aircraft rifles and twelve 21-inch torpedo tubes above water.

They have a speed of from 30 to 40 knots. The estimated cost was \$11,000,000 each. They have a triple hull designed to give the greatest possible protection against submarines.

**Second Generation Serves as Juryman**

SAN LUIS OBISPO, March 26.—Tom Nakaji was called upon, and acted as a juror recently on a Coroners Jury at the County Coroner, on the inquisition of the death of a Benny Alvarez, who met his death by being tangled up in an electric dough mixing machine in a bakery.

Accidental death was the verdict brought in by the Coroners Jury, as read by their foreman.

Nakaji, who is manager and secretary of the San Luis Obispo Growers Association, is one of the most popular young men of this city, and is widely known and liked by both Japanese and Americans for his unselfish efforts in trying to help everybody.

Tom Nakaji will be remembered as a San Francisco boy who attended both grammar and high school there. Many of his friends will be glad to know he is making good.

The local Japanese will disband the cage season and step right into baseball, according to latest report from the Shows headquarters.


## Stockton Greets Three New Comers

## FLOOD HITS JAPANESE COMMUNITY

Watsonville Under Water, School Closed

WATSONVILLE, March 26.—Due to the persistent rainfall of the last several days, the worst flood in twelve years occurred in this city, inundating both the Japanese and the Chinese communities to the depths of eight feet in many places, while the American section of the town from the Pajero River to the city park was completely under water.

All traffic was stopped in the inundated area, and many automobiles were seen half submerged in the water or on the verge of being washed away by the raging current.

Because communication to the stricken area has been obstructed, no definite estimate of loss could be made. The Japanese lettuce ranches in the vicinity of the river were flooded, and if the present water does not subside soon the crops will be totally damaged.

The flood rose rapidly and reached the four feet mark Saturday. The water remained at this point until the next day, when the current rose ominously in sweeping torrent and flooded the Chinese and Japanese residents, causing much concern to all. The public schools here were closed today.
