NOW OR NEVER.
To vote in the presidential primaries in November American citizens of Japanese ancestry must register within the next forty-eight hours, or give up the privilege—one of the greatest ever bestowed on a people—which is their birth-right.

In the recent general elections held in Japan almost ninety per cent of the citizens of the country enfranchised for the first time in the history of the empire, went to the polls. They knew the value of suffrage. They had fought for years to obtain it. When they received it they manifested their appreciation over that fact by registering and going to the polls.

Statistics reveal that but sixty per cent of all American citizens of voting age go to the polls. One reason for this is that the value of the rights to which they are born has not been sufficiently imprinted in their minds. American people of the present day have not experienced the hardships faced by peoples of other countries where general manhood suffrage is not a right of the people.

It is our wish that American citizens of Japanese ancestry will keep this fact in mind—especially during the next forty-eight hours if they have not already registered.

George Kuwa, Movie Actor, To Leave For Japan, Film Comedy

LOS ANGELES, March 28.—George Kuwahara, better known in Hollywood as George Kuwa, who is known among the movie fans for his appearance in movie productions with the leading actors of the film colony for the past twelve or thirteen years, will bid his friends adieu and return to Japan for an extensive exploitation of the movie business there.

Having had considerable experience with the production of films while in Hollywood, he expects to make use of his knowledge while engaged in his proposed venture in Japan. His plan is to form a special production company for the purpose of making short reel comedies. He believes that this type of films have not yet been developed sufficiently, and he sees a great future for them.

Kuwahara will leave for Nippon on the N. Y. K. liner Siberia which sets sail from here on April 3. Many friends of this city will give him a farewell party at the Fujii.

George Kuwa is known by practically every actor and actress of importance and count as his friends such luminaries as Antonio Moreno, Jack Holt, the late Wallace Reid, Lon Chaney, Charles Chaplin, Jack Coogan, Pola Negri, Alice Terry, and others. He expects to return to Hollywood after completing his work in Japan.
