## DUCE PAYS HOMAGE TO JAPANESE

### Mussolini Sends Envoy To Grave In Aizu

Special to the Japanese American News  
TOKYO, April 5—Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy today paid high homage to Japan through the Italian Ambassador whom he dispatched on a special mission to Aizu Prefecture in the north where Japan's historic Byakkotai, or "white tiger" boys are buried.

Before the grave of these youths who, during the Imperial Restoration period some seventy years ago, gave up their lives in a valiant effort to protect their lord against the Emperor's troops, the Italian Ambassador, Tuneso Matsudaira, now at Washington.

Father of Envoy  
It is of special interest in this connection to note that the Lord of Aizu to whom the Byakkotai paid allegiance, was the father of Ambassador Tuneso Matsudaira, now at Washington.

The valorous gallantry of the Byakkotai, sons of chivalrous samurai, none of whom was over 16 years of age, in defending the Castle of Aizu against unsurmountable odds is said to be unsurpassed in bravery and heroism of all the deeds performed in Japan's history.

Only Sixteen Left  
As the powerful forces of the Emperor closed in on their lord's castle, these youths fought until but sixteen of them remained before seeking refuge in a nearby hill. Here they committed "harakiri" when, on beholding their castle on fire, they realized that no hope remained of ever repelling the Emperor's troops.

Their deed is sung by the children of this country and are frequently re-enacted on the stage. Their grave on Mt. Imori, which overlooks the site of the ancient Castle of Aizu, is visited by thousands each month.

## Sojin in Picture At The Imperial

Kamiyama Sojin, considered by many to be the greatest Oriental actor on the screen, will be seen at the Imperial Theatre in the picture "The Chinese Parrot." The showing starts on April 6 and will continue for one week.

Sojin was born in Sendai, Japan and is one of the very few natives of that province ever to migrate to foreign shores. Although a Japanese, his favorite forte is in portraying Chinese roles. His first big part was with Douglas Fairbanks in "The Thief of Bagdad," in which he was the Prince of Mongolia. Since then he has appeared in many outstanding productions.

## U. S., JAPAN ALLIES FOR 74 YEARS

### Treaty Of Peace Signed By Commodore Perry

CHICAGO, ILL., April 5—Seventy-four years ago this year Commodore Perry as "Special Ambassador" of the United States signed the first "Treaty of Peace, Amity and Commerce" with Japan.

Today Teijiro Tamura, consul of Japan, in commemorating the anniversary declared it "a happy privilege for me to extend Japan's most cordial greetings to the American public in this section of the United States, by recalling the lofty ideal of friendliness and mutual respect, with which our earlier treaties were animated, in the earnest hope that they may survive as the guiding spirit in all international dealings between the United States and Japan for all ages to come."

Signed Pact  
"On March 31, 1854 at a small fishing village in Kanagawa (now a part of Yokohama)," Consul Tamura said, "Commodore Matthew Galbraith Perry culminated his two years' deliberation with the feudal commissioners of the Shogunate Government of Japan, signed and sealed a simple but very important document entitled 'Treaty of Peace, Amity and Commerce.'"

"It consisted of twelve articles, which should be a 'perfect, permanent, and universal peace, and a sincere and cordial amity between the two nations without exception of persons and places.' This was further strengthened by the inclusion in the treaty of 1854 a rather unique provision which, not only would place the President of the United States in the role of a 'friendly mediator,' so requested by Japan, in any international difference that might arise between Japan and any European power but also offered 'friendly aid and assistance' of the U. S. Navy to Japanese vessels on high seas insofar as it could be done 'without a breach of neutrality.'"

Admittance Sought  
"It is interesting to note that in these early days of the American-Japanese diplomacy, it was the Americans who so persistently sought admittance to Japan in spite of her unwillingness and that it was not until as late as in the treaty of 1854 that citizens of both countries were given 'full liberty to enter, travel or reside in any part of the territories' of the other on the same footing as its native citizens."

"Of the several subsequent treaties the 'Arbitration convention' has already been thrice renewed since 1908, the present extension expiring on August 13 of this year. "Historically, this first Japanese-American treaty, deliberated and signed by the staunch soldier-diplomats brought the two friendly nations together, but its moral significance is beyond appraisal."

## Japan Pins Olympics Hopes On Four Noteworthy Track And Field Stars

TOKYO, April 5—Japan is pinning its hopes for a place among the champions of the coming Olympic games in Amsterdam upon four athletes, the best in their respective lines ever produced in the Orient.

Mikio Oda is Japan's all around star, holder of a number of records, although only a boy of 22 years, standing 5 foot 6 in his track shoes. He holds the Japanese record for the running high jump at 1.92 meters, the running broad jump at 7.37 meters, and the hop, step and jump at 15.55 meters—all within respectable distance of the Olympic and world records.

Pole Vault Star  
Nakazawa, pole vaulter, is another pride of Japan, his performance placing him among the first six of the world. His best mark was made last year when he lifted

the Japanese record from 3.80 meters to 3.90, a vault above the official records of all countries except the United States.

Japan's fastest sprinter in the Olympic team is Alzawa, who stepped the 100meters last fall in 10 7-10, within 1-10 of the Englishman Abraham's Olympic record.

Woman Holds Record  
The fourth member of the Japanese team looked for to bring honor to the homeland is Miss Kinue Hitomi, one of the few all around girl athletes of the East. She is the only woman of the East officially listed as a world record holder, her victories in the running and the standing broad jumps at Gothenburg, in the second women's Olympic games, placing her among the champions, which the taking of second place in the discus throw event confirmed.

## NEXT ARMS PARLEY MUST BE IN TOKYO

### Japanese Minister Of Navy Says Success Cannot Be Attained Unless Confab Meets In Nippon

TOKYO, April 5—Unless the next arms limitation conference is held in this city success will not crown the efforts of Great Britain, the United States, France Italy and Japan in their desire to reduce world naval armaments.

This belief, expressed recently by Admiral K. Okada, Minister of Navy, is gradually extending to circles outside of the navy and army as reports filter in from Washington and London of the pessimism with which future arms limitation conferences are looked upon.

Graceful Compliment  
As the first parley was held in Washington and the second in Europe, it is maintained here that the calling of a conference in this country would be a graceful compliment to Japan.

There is, however, more practical reason for choosing Tokyo as the meeting place of the next naval parley. The only flaw is that Tokyo's cable facilities are not of the best.

Rates Exorbitant  
Rates are exorbitant, militating against the world being given that full and complete report of the conference which the world desires and should have in the affairs of this kind.

This, however, is counteracted by the much more important fact that the United States and Great Britain are now dickering unsuccessfully over the meeting place of the next conference. Washington wants a parley in the United States. Great Britain wants it in England. As a compromise Japan believes they should come to Tokyo.

## CHAPLIN TO SEE TOKYO

### Postpones Trip To Be Able To See Coronation

TOKYO, April 5—Charlie Chaplin, noted motion picture comedian will postpone his proposed trip to Japan, which was to have been made this month, until September to be able to present at the Imperial Coronation ceremonies in Kyoto in November, according to word received here today from Los Angeles.

Chaplin announced late last year that he would leave Hollywood this spring for Nippon and elaborate preparations have been under way here to welcome the actor.

While some disappointment is naturally expressed over the postponement of his trip due to the upsetting of the reception program, his friends here declare that Chaplin would benefit much more by coming here this fall.
