THE JAPANESE FLAG

Little of the romance and glamour which mark the history of the Stars and Stripes are attached to the beginnings of the Rising Sun banner of Nippon.

The "Hinomaru" as the emblem of Japan is known, attained its existence as an official national standard for the purpose of differentiating Japanese ships from foreign vessels during the Tokugawa Shogunate some seventy-four years ago.

Adopted in 1854, the flag was, however, in existence long before the Star Spangled Banner saw the light of day, but it was not until 1854 that it was adopted as the official emblem of Nippon.

Before that it was employed mainly for the purpose of distinguishing Japanese vessels from those flying flags of foreign countries.

The Rising Sun banner was chosen as the national emblem by the Tokugawa Shogunate on the suggestion of Lord Nariaki Shimazu, whose descendants rank among the highest princes and princesses of Japan's noble families today.

Brought Here in 1860 The first vessel to bear the Rising Sun flag to this country was the warship Kanryu which carried the first Shogunate envoy to the United States in 1860.

That the Hinomaru-no-Hata was used by various chieftains in olden Japan there is little doubt. Its appearance is first recorded 600 years ago. But, as was the case with chieftains of the various clans until the time of the Tokugawa Shogunate, it was not recognized as a national banner and in adopting it as the national emblem in 1854 the Shogunate was influenced not in the least by the history of the Sun flag despite the fact that such famous warriors as Shingen Takeda, Kenshin Tesugi, Masamune Date, and Hideyoshi Toyotomi, flew the Rising Sun flag in the field.

Following the overthrow of the Shogunate, the Tokyo Government confirmed the adoption of the Rising Sun banner as the national standard by a proclamation issued three years after the Imperial Restoration.

Forced to Wave Flag The public, however, abstained from flying this flag until it was forced to do so on New Year's day, 1873. Ever since then the Hinomaru-no-Hata has waved over the land of the rising sun.

Powerful Japanese University Team To Play U. C.

Sixteen Kelo varsity ball players, champions of the Far East, arrived in port aboard the N. Y. K. liner Taiyo Maru yesterday for a two-months' barnstorming tour of the United States. Professor Matsutaro Naoki, leader, and Hisashi Koshimoto, coach and manager, are in charge of the boys.

Kelo's first game will be played against the University of California at Berkeley next Wednesday. "We want to play as many Japanese teams on the Coast as possible," Koshimoto told The Japanese American News yesterday. "Besides games with the Alameda Talibus and the Los Angeles Nippon, scheduled for April 22 and May 3, respectively, we plan to accommodate the San Jose Asahis and the Sacramento Nippon before we leave for the East."

Going To Hawaii Fresno we want to play on the last Saturday before we leave here for Hawaii June 20.

"An all-star Japanese team from the section around Salinas, Watsonville, and Santa Cruz has made a request for a game to be played in Watsonville. We shall try to accommodate them if possible."

Field. It is essential that the chrysanthemum be invariably of sixteen petals. If this flower is used by families outside of the nobility, it must be with a number of petals less or more than sixteen.

It is interesting to note in this connection that the chrysanthemum crest did not originally represent the chrysanthemum flower at all but the sun with sixteen rays, and it will be noticed that in the "sun burst" flag of the Navy the rays of the sun are sixteen in number. The use of the number sixteen is probably traceable to Chinese geomantic ideas.

TEACHERS NEEDED IN FAR EAST

Second Generation College Grads Wanted

Japan needs more second generation American college graduates to instruct her students in English, and significant steps are being taken to encourage such teachers to visit Japan for this purpose. Professor Yoshimune Abe, dean of Aoyama Gakuin, Tokyo, who arrived yesterday aboard the N. Y. K. liner Taiyo Maru told The Japanese American News.

"American-born Japanese youths, with their excellent command of the English language, are very useful," Abe declared. "For this reason seventy mission schools in Japan, through their representatives at an educational conference, decided to invite second generation members to teach in these schools for two years."

Doshisha was a pioneer in this movement, and partly due to its success we are also taking this step. One of our second generation members, Miss Sumie Morishita, may be with us before long.

Subjects of Nippon Win Fight; May Form Corporations; Webb Given 2 Weeks To Present Questions On Controversy

WASHINGTON, April 13—(Special)—Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court, William Howard Taft, today dismissed the appeal of Attorney General U. S. Webb of the State of California in California's legal fight to prohibit subjects of Japan from leasing land and forming corporations in the State.

Attorney General Webb was, however, given two weeks in which to present questions regarding the controversy over a Japanese hospital at Los Angeles which he will have the Supreme Court review.

When the Secretary of State of California refused to incorporate the hospital at the request of K. Tashiro and other Japanese with rights to lease land, the State courts held that under the terms of a treaty with Japan the company could not be denied the right, and "compelled the Secretary of State, to file certain articles of incorporation prepared and executed by the petitioners," despite the fact that the petitioners are resident subjects of the state of California ineligible to citizenship, and by virtue of this fact normally unable to lease property or form corporations.

Dismisses Appeal Chief Justice Taft, after hearing Attorney General Webb's appeal today, dismissed the appeal for want of jurisdiction, but announced he would give Webb an opportunity to show that questions are involved upon which the court in jurisdiction should pass.

This, it is generally understood, means that the State of California has completely lost its battle against the Japanese people.

By the terms of the treaty of April 8, 1911 between the United States and Japan, the right of Japanese subjects in the United States to carry on trade in specific lines of business such as conducting manufacturing, warehouses and shops and leasing land for commercial purposes on as extensive and complete a scale as that employed by native citizens, was admitted.

NAKAGAWA'S NOVEL SOLD OUT IN EAST

SACRAMENTO, April 11—(Special)—With 25,000 copies of John Nakagawa's novel, "The Rendezvous of Mystery," sold within 10 hours of their publication on March 15, Dorrance and Company of Philadelphia has published another edition of 25,000 copies for distribution on the Pacific Coast.

Due to the great popularity of his first book, Nakagawa has begun his new novel, the narrative of which will portray the famous Russian River valley as its background.

Nakagawa has just concluded a five-year contract with his publishers for the publication of all books he may write within that period.

In Sacramento "The Rendezvous of Mystery" is on sale at the Levinson and Purnell book stores on K street. With a view to celebrating Nakagawa's success leading Japanese of this city are planning to hold a party in his honor some time in the near future.
