

Los Angeles Hotel Man, Visiting Nippon, Finds Good Feeling Towards America And Americans Everywhere In Japan

TOKYO, May 25.—(By Mail)—A hotel men's delegation to Japan on alternate years may be one of the results of the present delegation of leading Pacific Coast hotel managers, according to Mr. Arthur A. Dodworth, general manager of the "Oriental Caravan," who represents the Los Angeles Biltmore Hotel and the Bowman Hotels.

The delegates who arrived Friday on the Taiyo Maru, are here at the invitation of the Japan Hotel Association and are headed by Mr. Abe Frank of the Ambassador Hotel Corporation, Los Angeles. During their stay in Tokyo they are stopping at the Imperial Hotel.

"I feel that the general good feeling and understanding between Japan and the United States will be increased materially by our visit here," declared Mr. Dodworth Saturday.

"Without visiting Japan it is impossible to understand conditions here and I for one have been surprised at the general good feeling toward America and Americans encountered since my arrival."

"When we get back to the United States we can explain to others who are interested in the East, how enjoyable Japan is made for the visitor and I feel that our opinions will have more weight than many advertisements, since we have actually traveled here."

Mr. Dodworth said he felt that American hotels could take lessons from those in Japan, especially regarding courteous service. He commented upon the fact that no outstretched hands greeted the visitor at every turn and declared that he considered the Japanese systems of tipping at the time of paying the bill an excellent idea which, to his knowledge, never has been followed in the United States.

He praised the Imperial Hotel and especially mentioned the food, which he considers excellent. He remarked that the vegetables, for example, were cooked in the correct fashion, which is exceptional for a hotel.

"Our trip on the Taiyo was so enjoyable that we were sorry to leave. I was particularly interested in the celebration of the Emperor's birthday aboard the ship."

WARM DAYS DRIVE L. A. TO PICNICS

Southern Californians Prepare Many Outings

LOS ANGELES, June 8.—(Special)—Japanese residents of Southern California are preparing with great anticipation for the various community picnics and field meets this week end.

At the Sunset Beach, an outing sponsored by the Norwalk Japanese Language School, with the cooperation of the Japanese residents of Norwalk, Artesia, Santa Fe, Downey, and Los Nietos, will be held Saturday. The climax of the all-day program will be the "sumo" tournament in which leading young wrestlers of that locality will vie for the hundreds of prizes offered by a special committee.

Many Races Planned. The program will start at 11 a. m. with a brief greeting by Mr. Nawa, general chairman followed by a series of field events and unusual competitions for old and young alike.

Twenty nine exciting events, followed by a baseball game will be the attractions of the day at the community picnic and field meet to be sponsored Sunday at Guadalupe under the auspices of the Guadalupe and Santa Maria language schools. ASSASSIN ATTACKS PREMIER OF JAPAN; SLASHES AIDE BUT IS FOILED IN DEATH MISSION IN CROWDED RAILWAY STATION

Tanaka Escapes Unscathed As Man Is Held

TOKYO, June 8.—(Special to The Japanese American News)—A youthful would-be assassin at 9:28 o'clock this morning made an unsuccessful attempt to take the life of Premier Giichi Tanaka in the crowded Ueno Railway Station in this city.

The fanatic, wielding a Japanese dagger and dashed toward the Premier as the latter entered the station. K. Matsuura, a Member of Parliament who was accompanying the Premier was slashed on the limbs as he attempted to block the pathway.

The would-be assassin, who gave his name as Shingo Okamura, 25, of Shizuoka Prefecture, was immediately taken into custody by the police and is being held at police headquarters pending investigation. The Premier was on his way to Utsunomiya, near Tokyo, to attend a meeting of the Seiyukai Party.

The present incident closely resembles that several years ago in Tokyo station when the late Premier K. Hara lost his life at the hands of a youthful political fanatic.

On that occasion Hara, Liberal leader, was also on his way to attend a political meeting. As he entered the railway station the youth dashed towards him and stabbed him in the breast. The Premier died almost immediately.

Despite the unfortunate incident this morning Premier Tanaka continued his trip. Enroute he told newspaper reporters that while he regretted the occurrence of this affair he felt that fate destined him to escape death. Some years previously, he explained, he was shot at by a Korean in Shanghai, but the bullet ran wild and killed an American.

The Minister of Home Affairs, in a statement on the incident, said today he believed the youthful assassin was not influenced by communism. Police say the man was suffering from tuberculosis.

(Continued from yesterday) at its base. At Kamakura Yoritomo set up his bakufu, or camp government, out of which he developed the Shogunate. Kamakura rapidly became a metropolis; marked at first by Spartan simplicity in contrast with luxurious Kyoto, and famed for all time by its colossal Dai-Butsu, or Great Buddha, undertaken at Yoritomo's suggestion.

The first task assigned to Yoshitsune by his elder brother was to go over to Kyoto, three hundred miles away and punish a presumptuous Minamoto general, their cousin. This warrior had dealt a very heavy blow to the Taira. He not only seized Kyoto, but compelled its defenders to flee, taking with them their little seven-year old Aniko, old Kiyomori's grandson and now titular Emperor. But the victory turned the head of the Minamoto general, so that he had aroused the suspicions of Yoritomo, who never brooked rivalry, even from a cousin—or a brother, as events were to prove. Yoshitsune whipped the presumptuous general so severely that he took his own life.
