As the last number, the Kwansei Gakuin boys sang their school song. The party disbanded with the singing of "Auld Lang Syne."


REGISTRATION AT Y TO OPEN MONDAY EVE


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THEY FINANCE HOOVER'S EASTERN CAMPAIGN

Letture Slow In Gaining Volume, Denver Reports

DENVER, Colo., August 10.—The Colorado lettuce deal continued slow in gaining volume this week as most sections of the state reported a late crop that would not mature as early as expected at planting time. Shipments for the state will no doubt be lighter than last year by the end of the season, but the big difference in shipments at this time is due largely to set-backs the crop suffered from cold weather during the growing season.

The movement from the San Luis Valley to date is far behind last season's and indications are that it will never catch up. The crop is much lighter than last season's, as a great amount of last year's lettuce acreage was devoted to peas this season. Early plantings were expected to get the jump on last year's movement from both the southern and western ends of the valley but this has failed to materialize.

The Eagle Valley started actual shipping early this week. Avon, Edwards, Eagle and Minturn loaded some lettuce and some mixed peas and lettuce. Shipments from the Eagle valley are also slow for this time of the season as the crop is as late in comparison, as it is in the San Luis Valley.

The crop of lettuce as a whole, is claimed to be lighter than last season. Plantings have been cut about one-fifth this season and yields promise no such mark as was attained last season. The average movement should not pass 50 cars daily this year.

BE LOYAL TO U.S., YOUTHS ARE TOLD

Consul At Hawaii Talks to Second Generation

HONOLULU, August 10.—Loyalty to the American flag, courtesy to their fellow men and willingness to do their duty were urged upon delegates to the New American's conference by acting Consul General Takeuchi at a luncheon gathering yesterday afternoon. The consul said:

I understand that you have just held today the opening session of the second annual Conference of New Americans which is to call your serious attention during the next seven days. This conference of New Americans, attended by the representative leaders of the various islands in Hawaii, I take it, is perhaps the most important piece of constructive work that has been undertaken in recent years for the benefit of so-called second generation Japanese. The aims of the conference are lofty. Its purposes are practical. The mutual counsel and deliberation provided for in the agenda, over weighty questions pertaining to American citizens of Japanese parentage, are bound to bring the greatest benefit to the young people of Hawaii and I am sure will pave the way for the solution of the difficulties with which you are at present confronted.

The United States of America is a great country, both in spirit and size. She is great enough to absorb all immigrants that come to her shores from many parts of the world, developing the good qualities they bring from their homelands as she passes her new people through the mill of Americanization. And it is her composite character, made of many leading qualities of many different peoples, that adds to the greatness of America today. All of you were born and reared in America. You have already all the rights and privileges incidental to American citizenship. And you are very fortunate in this respect.

Ladies and gentlemen, your future is bright with many opportunities. In meeting those opportunities which lie before you, you, as American citizens, should stand at all times willing and ready to serve America.

Your parents, with a historical background of over 2500 years have passed her new people through the ages. Their culture, it may be safely said, contains some of the beautiful teachings. This culture is our contribution toward the betterment of the world. I trust that you will develop them further and make them a part of your American life. Loyalty is one of the things I am referring to. In the matter of loyalty your stand should be unquestioned. Since you owe your allegiance to the American flag, your stand should be absolute.

Courtesy is another thing. Willingness to perform your duty is still another. These are characteristic beauties of the Japanese culture. I hope that you will fully inherit and practice them in your daily life, so that America will respect and say to the country of your parents: "You have given us good adopted girls and boys for our household."

You can thus become a connecting link between Japan and America and contribute your share to the country that knocked at the doors of Japan many years ago to give her introduction to the world at large.

FRESNO MAY BE SCENE OF NEXT WINTER OLYMPIAD

FRESNO, August 13.—(Special)—Fresno county may be the scene of the Winter sports of the tenth Olympic games in January and February of 1932, according to world received at the Fresno County Chamber of Commerce today.

Request for detailed information, photographs and statistics describing in full Fresno County's facilities for handling the international Winter sports has been received by Dick Down of the local chamber, from Ray Davidson, of the California Tenth Olympiad Association with headquarters at Los Angeles.

Hutington or Shaver Lake are the sites for the sports favored by local chamber at the present time. Offering ideal natural facilities in addition to ease of access and a central geographical location in the state, either of these two bodies of water are admirably suited for the Winter sports competition.

It will bring athletes and spectators from all parts of the world to view the games and give Fresno County a large share in staging the first Olympiad ever held in the Western Hemisphere.

Date To Be Obtained. The chamber of commerce has begun an intensive campaign to secure the games here. Committees are working on data, photographs and other information to picture the advantages of holding the games here to the Olympiad association.

Present plans of the association call for the spreading of the games to as many parts of the state as possible. It is believed that the swimming program of the competition will be held at the Fishlake Playfield in San Francisco, while Los Angeles will hold most of the track and other games.

There is no suitable place to hold the Winter games in the southern part of the state, while Fresno County's Sierra region is ideal in nearly every respect. Lake Tahoe has also been considered for the project.

FRUIT TRADE IMPROVING IN S. F. MARKETS

Some improvement was noted in fruit trading this week and prices were steady in most instances. The cantaloupe market was rather easy at the opening of the week, but showed some strength later. Receipts of Gravenstins continued to heavy and the market was generally dull. The peach market was drab.

The berry market was unchanged. There was some improvement in trading on practically all varieties of grapes. Trading in the vegetable market was only fair. Vegetables generally did not attract much attention. A good demand existed for cauliflower. The tomato market showed strength. The lettuce market was in fairly good shape.

Reputed to be one of the strongest university teams in the country, the U. of I. aggregation is expected to furnish strong opposition for the leading Japanese nines.

San Mateo To Hold Fete At Masonic Hall

SAN MATEO, August 15.—(Special)—The Japanese population of this city and vicinity will conduct an elaborate celebration to commemorate the Feast of Lanterns Sunday evening in the Masonic Hall from 5 o'clock.

The first part of the program will consist of memorial exercises in which leading Japanese residents here will deliver eloquent tributes to the pioneers of this city who have passed beyond.

RECORD VOTE IS FORESEEN

Republic Leaders Optimistic After Conference

Following a San Francisco conference, at which he was assured that "the west is safe for Hoover," Hubert Work, chairman of the Republican national committee, was en route east yesterday.

Before attending the notification ceremony for Sen. Charles Curtis, candidate for vice-president, Work will stop in Denver. He will reach Washington several days before Hoover arrives here for his intensive campaign in the east.

Charles Neumiller, chairman of the State Republican committee; Mark Requa, director of the state campaign, and other party leaders were more optimistic than ever today over the probability of Hoover pulling up a record majority in California.

There was also optimism over the reports to the conference that Hoover was making steady gains in southern states usually considered unquestionably Democratic.

Hoover was in San Francisco for more than an hour Monday afternoon, attending a meeting of the board of trustees of Stanford University. He has served on the board since 1912.

The feature of the afternoon's program was the presentation of a brilliant Japanese entertainment in the huge open-air theater, in which scores of talented Japanese, assembled from all over southern California to give an impressive program. It is estimated that 15,000 people witnessed the afternoon's program in the theater.

The feature of the afternoon was the glamorous "odori" entitled "Dance of the Four Seasons," performed by a bevy of kimono-clad Japanese girls. Exhibitions of Jiu-jitsu, "gekken," or Japanese fencing, harmonica selections by Homare Watanuki of Japan, archery and a series of musical numbers and skits provided a program which won high praise from the exposition officials. Ken Nakazawa of the local consulate gave a brief greeting and explanation of Japanese art.

Stately Palace Is Bedeck With Gay Streamers

LONG BEACH, August 15.—(Special)—A vast throng of 25,000 Japanese, declared to be the largest gathering of Orientals to be assembled at one time in Southern California, crowded the grounds of the Pacific Southwest Exposition Sunday to participate in the mammoth "Japan Day" celebration, which attracted approximately 110,000 people from all sections of the state.

The huge and stately Nippon Palace, which houses the Japanese exhibits, was bedecked with gay streamers and multitudes of flags of the Rising Sun, presented a gorgeous spectacle which attracted thousands of visitors. A specially constructed outdoor pavilion near the palace drew other thousands who came to partake of refreshments served by a score of pretty Nippon maids in colorful costumes of the Land of Cherry Blossoms.

Consul Presents Flag

The program of the day opened with an impressive ceremony, in which Consul Mizusawa, Japanese consul, presented a large silken Japanese flag to the officials of the exposition and the mayor of Long Beach in behalf of the Japanese residents of this city and Los Angeles.

In making the presentation, Mizusawa declared that he hoped the flag would be a perpetual reminder of the cordial relationship existing between the Japanese and American peoples.

Mayor Accepts Flag. Expressing appreciation for the enthusiasm which the Japanese have shown in cooperating with the exposition officials, the mayor of Long Beach accepted the flag. Then followed the singing of the American anthem by 50 Japanese Boy Scouts.

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Banquet Is Given. A brilliant good-will banquet, sponsored in the fashionable Virginia Hotel of Long Beach, marked the highlight of the evening's function. Some 400 guests, including leading citizens and city officials as well as representatives of the Japanese community, attended. Consul K. Mizusawa presided, while the main address in behalf of the Japanese people was made by M. Nakamura of the Los Angeles Japanese Association.



