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## NORTHERN CALIFORNIA'S YOUNG CHRISTIANS PLAN HUGE THREE-DAY CONFAB

Parley To Be Staged In Bay City On Oct. 12, 13, 14

The executive board of the Northern California Japanese Young People's Christian Federation, following its first business session of the term in Stiles Hall, Berkeley, announced that this year's conference will be held either in San Francisco or Berkeley for 3 days commencing Friday morning Oct. 12.

More than 300 delegates from the leading Japanese communities of Northern California are expected to assemble in the Bay district for this mammoth gathering, which will be featured by inspirational addresses from noted pulpit speakers of this section.

While detailed program has not yet been announced, it is known that the coming conference will have several new features, and ample provisions will be made to give the delegates opportunity to discuss vital problems with which they are confronted. The meeting Sunday was attended by representatives of young people's Christian organizations of this section, which will be hosts to the delegates and members of the executive board.

The Northern California Japanese Young People's Christian Federation is composed of half a hundred organizations federated for the purpose of working for unity of Christian forces. It boasts of a membership of nearly 800 and is considered the largest second generation body in the country.

In order to work out the details of the program as well as to determine the meeting place of the conference, the Japanese pastors of the Bay cities will confer with the executive board of the Federation Thursday evening from 5:30 o'clock at a dinner to be held at Pekin Low in Oakland. The hosts for the occasion will be Rev. C. Tagashira of Berkeley, chairman of the Young People's department of the Japanese Church Federation; Rev. S. Kowta, of San Francisco, secretary; and the following members of the young people's committee: Rev. K. Fukushima of Fresno, Rev. T. Takayama of Watsonville, and Rev. S. Watanabe of Sacramento.

Young Christians of the state, who have any suggestions to offer in making this year's conference more effective than those in the previous years are urged to communicate with the officials of the Federation. This body, which is now in its fourth year of existence, finds its conferences attended by more delegates each year, and the coming gathering is expected to shatter all previous records.

## 500 DROWN IN CHOSÉN

### 700 Houses Swept As Torrent Floods Korea

SEOUL, Korea, September 3.—(UP)—Five hundred and ten persons were known to have drowned in floods along the Yalu River basin the governor of Kankyonando Province reported today.

Seven hundred houses were destroyed as the great torrent of water swept down through the valley.

It was feared there would be additional casualties.

The report added that bridges and roads were damaged as the flood waters, which came after the heavy recent rains, washed over them.

Relief measures already have been started through the district where the suffering is reported most serious.
