

TABLES ARE TURNED IN MANCHURIA

Chinese, Humiliated
By Czarists, Now Rule Country

TTSISHAR, Manchuria: When one travels on the Russian railway, the Eastern Chinese line, from Paganchnaya to Manchuria and observes the hard struggle the Russians are keeping up in the face of the steady onslaughts of the Chinese, one begins to understand the real significance of the persistent, at times feverish, "Red" attempts to influence, if possible capture, the Nationalist movements in South China. For the rise of Russian prestige in the south has its immediate repercussion upon the Chinese attitude towards the Soviet in this part of the country where Russia has great material interests.

In the palmy days of the Borodin regime at Hankow the Russian stock in North Manchuria rose phenomenally. The Chinese railway guards and the Chinese of the Eastern Chinese Railway who had, since the Russian revolution of 1917, looked down upon their Soviet colleagues suddenly changed their attitude and began to treat the Russians with a show of respect. But the Borodin regime was shortlived. Its collapse again lowered the Chinese estimate of Russia, and the Russians in Manchuria have been forced to put up with all manner of indignities and even brutalities at the hands of the Chinese.

Chinese Beat Russians

On August 18, the day I arrived here from Tsinan-fu in Eastern Inner Mongolia, the Chinese Eastern Railway was attacked by Mongolian insurgents at a point 150 miles east of Tsinshih. The engineer of an eastbound train which was held up at Ilkete, in compliance with the instructions from the head office, tried to turn back to avoid possible danger, when the Chinese railway guards for some unknown reason intervened and stopped the train. When the engineer and the station master, both Russian, remonstrated, they were administered a sound beating by the Chinese soldiers.

Incredible as it may seem such is one of frequent occurrence. Ever since May, 1921, when Marshall Chang Tsu-ji, taking advantage of the strike of the Russian railway guards, disarmed them, and replaced them with his own men, the unruly conduct of the Chinese soldiery has been the cause of perpetual complaint on the part of the Russians. Even a casual traveller cannot fail to notice this.

Chinese Defiant

When I was coming here from Harbin on a local train there were 24 passengers in the second-class car. Of these 20 were Chinese—15 soldiers and five civilians. All of them, except one civilian, had a pass. When the conductor, a Russian, came to examine the passes, some of the soldiers paid no attention or looked at him contemptuously. Only after repeated remonstrances did they produce their papers, thrusting them before the conductor's face in an insulting manner. Not infrequently the conductors, in similar circumstances, are brutally assaulted.

Twenty years ago, when Czarist Russia lorded it over Manchuria, I travelled through this country, and observed with indignation the brutal conduct of the Russians, both soldiers and civilians, toward the Chinese. In those days no Chinese dared argue with the Russians. The Chinese were kicked and beaten as if they were animals. Now the tables have been turned, and the Chinese are taking vengeance upon their former overlords.

120,000 Russians in Manchuria

There are about 120,000 Russians in Manchuria. Harbin alone harbors 80,000 of them. Some of these are confirmed "Reds," a few naturalized Chinese, but most emigres or stateless Russians. Most, practically all, of the "Reds" are officials and employees of the Eastern Chinese Railway, as it has been Soviet policy to eliminate "White" elements from the personnel of the company. The emigres are for the most part in a terrible plight, eking out a living by doing menial labour for whomever may employ them, often by begging at the doors of Chinese or Japanese. Almost every day, in Harbin alone, two or three Russians commit suicide to escape starvation.

Most of the emigres in Manchuria are called "radish Russians"—red outside, white inside. White to the core, they do not dare protest their conviction for fear they might be driven out of the country, if nothing worse.

It is doubtful whether the confirmed "Reds" occupying important positions on the Chinese Eastern Railway, are sincere believers in the Soviet ideals. Their practice and their mode of living seem to belie their professions. In Harbin it is no secret that they and their women folk live a gay life spending money with a lavish hand, for their salaries are as high, if not higher than were paid their predecessors under the

HAWAIIANS SCORE U. S. RED TAPE

Immigration Office Holds Up Parade In Honolulu

HONOLULU, Sept. 12.—(By mail) The McKinley High School baseball team champions of the Honolulu Interscholastic League, sailed off gayly this summer on a "good-will tour" to Japan. It came back yesterday after 16 days, with ten victories out of twelve starts. The team body, 2000 strong, and a large number of sports fans headed by the high school band were at the dock to parade in honor of the victorious homecomers.

Parade Delayed

But the homecomers were not able to land so gayly after all. Uncle Sam in the form of immigration office red tape, demanded that first the boys, nearly all of Oriental ancestry, although born in Hawaii, prove their American citizenship.

Possessions on which they traveled in Japan as American citizens did not suffice for the American officials. The boys had to prove their Hawaiian birth.

The parade waited. The boys would have to go to the immigration station. It was announced.

Red Tape Criticized

At the hearing Monday the boys produced birth certificates and witness and proved their citizenship.

Meantime the incident had caused widespread comment and criticism of the immigration red tape.
