## INTEREST SHOWN IN JAPAN ART

### Exhibit at De Young Museum Attracts Big Crowd

Due to the publicity given in the San Francisco papers on the two important events in Nippon, considerable interest is being shown in things Japanese as evidenced by the great crowd that is attracted by the exhibit of Japanese art in the M. H. de Young Memorial Museum in Golden Gate Park.

The Imperial wedding, which took place recently in Tokyo between His Imperial Highness Prince Chichibu and the former Miss Setuko Masuda, as well as the coming Imperial Enthronement which is scheduled for November 10 in Kyoto, have been given conspicuous write-ups here, and this is partly responsible. It is believed, to the fact that during the week 32,917 persons visited the museum chiefly to view the Japanese exhibits.

### PARK ORIENTAL GALLERY

In the Oriental gallery of the museum are several carvings representing wrestlers. One of these is of two men stripped, except for a loin cloth, and standing in a characteristic attitude of struggle, one of them with an expression of pain on his face as his antagonist applies severe pressure to his chin. The figures are about eighteen inches in height. Japanese wrestlers, although very strong and agile, are often very fat.

### CARVINGS OF WRESTLERS

Among the de Young Museum's collections of netukes—small carved toggles—are several carvings of wrestlers. One of these, of ivory, represents two wrestlers, with the umpire. Another ivory piece shows two contestants in the position of the arm-and-foot throw. A third is a wrestler with an empty sake bottle in his hand licking the wine cup.

### TYPICAL GEISHA GIRLS

Typical of Japanese festival occasions are the geisha girls. They are trained from infancy in dancing, serving tea and entertaining. A geisha girl is one of the porcelain figures in the Oriental ceramics gallery of the museum. The figures about eighteen inches high, dressed in a maroon kimono, trimmed in blue and white, green and yellow, and she is wearing a blue obi or belt. The kimono is not, in Japan, where it is a native, a lounging robe to be thrown on carelessly in periods of indolence or leisure, but it may be the most formal of garments for state occasions.

## Japanese Camp Fire Basketball Team Loses To Kleka Tasna Girls 11 to 16 In First Cage Game of Season in S. F.

Sixteen to eleven, Kleka Tasna sextette wins! So announced the score keeper at the Community House on Saturday night following the Kleka Tasna—Cheskhamay basketball game. That was all. But how little does the score tell the story.

The Cheskhamay girls, nervous, excited, as most teams are in their first game, went against a veteran squad and the score at the end of the first half indicated the American team made over three times as many points as the Japanese.

Down but not out, the Cheskhamay girls still kept on fighting. They scored 7 points in the last 5 minutes and left the impression in everyone's mind that they would have tied if the play had lasted a few minutes longer.

Haru Nakagawa and Kimi Uyeda were responsible for 7 and 4 points respectively, while Alice Dudack sunk 5 baskets for the Kleka Tasna six. Michi Nishida and Kimi Usami outplayed their opponents throughout the whole game, as the ball was always in the opponents' territory. The Japanese forwards were greatly handicapped in height.

Chizur Nakagawa and Sakaye Nakamoto made 4 units each. Helen Hantales, the Girls High star, was a dead eye on the basket and sank 6 during the game.

Tetsuko Tanimoto, speedy little center for the Japanese team, deserves special mention for her work. Nine out of ten times she had the jump over her taller opponents. Miyo Kinoshita also played well in both the preliminary and the main games.

## NIPPON IN DRY DRIVE

### Temperance Body Gets Approval for Dry Villages

TOKYO, Oct. 22.—The Japanese Temperance League is carrying on an intensive prohibition propaganda as its contribution to the celebration of the Imperial enthronement which will take place in Kyoto, November 10.

Girls are being encouraged to avoid lips that touch sake. Several associations of maidens pledged not to marry sake drinkers have appeared in the neighborhood of Yokohama.

The league has no official standing, but the social affairs bureau of the Home Office recently gave open approval to propaganda and public demonstrations against the use of alcoholic liquor. ## 11 PAY HUGE INCOME TAX

### Two Families Lead All Millionaires of Nippon

TOKYO, Oct. 19.—Japan has 11 multi-millionaires who pay more than 1,000,000 yen a year in income tax and eight of these belong to the two great families of merchant princes. Returns for the fiscal year which ended March 31, 1928, show six Mitsui, brothers and cousins, in this charmed circle.

The Mitsui's also supplied the largest individual taxpayer for 1927-28, taking that honor away from the Iwasakis. In 1926-27 Baron Kyuya Iwasaki topped the list with 4,000,000 yen to Baron Hachiroemon Mitsui's 3,000,000. Now it is the head of the House of Mitsui's turn, since he leads with 2,700,000 yen to his Iwasaki rival's 2,000,000.

## CAT TALES

The Russo-Japanese War of 1904-1905 added some glorious pages to the history of the Japanese Empire but Japan's victory over the powerful adversary would not have added so much credit to the reputation for her people as a civilized nation, had not such great men as Fleet-Admiral Togo and the late General Nogri shown by their noble deeds before the eye of the world's powers what the sons of Yamato are capable of. I am, however, under a moral obligation to make no mention of Fleet-Admiral Togo because he is a living man. So in the following lines, I propose to write something about the late General Nogri only.

Many people attribute the self-effacing noble life of the late General Nogri, hero of Port Arthur, to the culture he attained as a disciple of the late Nantembo, a celebrated priest of the Zen Sect, under whom he had once studied in company with the late General Gen-taro Kodama. It is a fact that General Nogri was much pleased with the teaching of the Zen Sect, which among others encourages a simple life, and always listened with great satisfaction to anecdotes told of an eminent Zen priest, Kansan, who is said to have often helped peasants in their farm of labour, and used a wisteria-vine for the ornament of his scarf. General used to say to his teacher, Nantembo:—"I think the spirit of the Zen Sect is essential for the training of good soldiers."

Putting aside the question if all the noble deeds of the late General were the outcome of his Zen training, we can say at least that the great soldier was a man who practiced much of the teaching of Zen.

**HIS NOBLE DEATH**  
To free us from the troubles of life and the fear of death is the ultimate aim of Buddhism. It is, however, man's weakness to long for life and try to live as long as possible. But in the eye of the Buddha life and death are nothing more serious than changes in the weather, meaning no addition to, or reduction from, the eternal life of the universe, just as the evaporation of the sea water under the scorching rays of the sun and continuous rainfalls in the rainy season can not change the total quantity of the water on the earth. Our desire after longevity, and fear of early death are but the outcome of our wrong conception of life. We think that we have nothing but our life in this world, which lasts only fifty to seventy years at the best. But those who have experienced spiritual awakening or have attained enlightenment, are ready to meet death at any moment.

## GERMAN ACE NOT CERTAIN ON HOP PLAN

### Tokyo Paper Praises Von Huenefeld and Two Co-Fliers

But in the eye of the Buddha life and death are nothing more serious than changes in the weather, meaning no addition to, or reduction from, the eternal life of the universe, just as the evaporation of the sea water under the scorching rays of the sun and continuous rainfalls in the rainy season can not change the total quantity of the water on the earth. Our desire after longevity, and fear of early death are but the outcome of our wrong conception of life. We think that we have nothing but our life in this world, which lasts only fifty to seventy years at the best. But those who have experienced spiritual awakening or have attained enlightenment, are ready to meet death at any moment.
