HUGE SHIPS UNDER PLAN

Dr. Eckener To Build 2 Dirigibles For Atlantic Hop

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, Nov. 2.—(UP)—Plans for building two vast dirigibles for transatlantic service, larger, faster and stronger than the Graf Zeppelin, were announced today by Dr. Hugo Eckener.

Dr. Eckener discussed the lessons learned from the trip of the Graf Zeppelin to the United States and return, which was completed here Thursday.

Eckener said two immense hangars would be required for the new leviathans of the air. One hangar would be in Berlin, he said, and the site of the other has not been decided.

However, he believed the Rhine valley was the most favorable spot for a central transatlantic airport.

Eckener repeated that the return flight of the Graf Zeppelin, during which she was beaten down almost to the water by a gale off Newfoundland and at times was close to disaster, had demonstrated that the Graf Zeppelin was inadequate for ocean service.

N. Y. HIT BY JAPAN PEST

Birds Disdain Beetle; Other States Are Invaded

NEW YORK.—(By Mail)—The Japanese beetle has pushed aside the gypsy moth and now occupies the spotlight. Any one who thinks this is a matter of concern only to farmers will be interested to learn that it has already secured a foothold in New York City, and swarms are now to be found in gardens and yards in certain localities.

One hundred were picked off in an afternoon recently from the small garden in the rear of the dwelling of Dr. N. L. Pritton, in the Bronx, almost within a stone's throw of the New York Botanical Garden, of which he is the director in chief.

Like other imported pests, it flourishes in a new environment, relieved from the attacks of the enemies it always had to resist in its old home.

BIRDS DISDAIN BEETLES. The birds are no help in this case. Whatever the birds of the Flowery Kingdom may think about the Japanese beetle, the birds here will not touch them. Possibly the evil-smelling oil secreted by the beetle explains this discrimination.

Discovered about two years ago, the beetle is now entrenched in Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey, Delaware and Connecticut. In New York the infested area embraces the five boroughs, the counties of Nassau, Rockland and Suffolk and some townships in Westchester County, according to the Department of Agriculture.

In Jenkintown, Pa., one man alone collected in one day seventy-four pounds of the beetles, sixty-two pounds the next day and fifty-two the following. It is fond of grapes, but extends its consumption to the leaves of the vine. This Jenkintown man made this big catch by the use of traps, set up on his grape trellis, cylindrical affairs of galvanized iron like sachans, baited with a sticky mass in which molasses predominated.

TWO KOREANS ARRESTED IN PLOT TO BOMB JAPAN EMPEROR AT CORONATION

Dynamite Found With Plotters: Conspiracy Believed to Have Been Hatched By Korean Nationalist Society

TOKYO, Nov. 3.—(Special)—What is believed to be a ghastly crime to assassinate H.I.M. The Emperor at the occasion of Imperial Enthronement was nipped in the bud today at Kyoto when two Koreans, members of the Korean Nationalist society, was arrested on the charge of conspiracy to dynamite the Japanese ruler.

Hongwanji Cagers Trim Sumida For League Supremacy

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 3.—(Special)—Thrilling an unusually large crowd of spectators by turning the tide in the last minute of play and defeating the Sumida quintette by 20-18 Tuesday night the Wanjin of the Nishihongwanji Temple last year's undisputed champions, regained supremacy as the first half of the league battle ended.

Here's How They Test University Training In Cafe

PORTLAND, Oct. 31.—(UP)—The old question of the value of a college education versus ordinary business acumen was being put to the test here today.

The business acumen part of it was being demonstrated by a local cafeteria proprietor who placed this announcement in his window: "Every twenty-fifth customer eats free."

The academic side was being taken care of by a group of college boys in front of the cafeteria. The leader had a small pair of field glasses trained on the cashier; in his other hand he held an automatic counter.

Every "twenty-fifth customer" over an hour had been an undergraduate, and every twenty-fifth tray had been piled sky-high.

From the look on the proprietor's face it appeared that the college proponents had won at least a temporary decision.

MEN HURT IN STRIKE RIOT

1000 Workers In Lock-out In Australia Menace Police

SYDNEY, Australia, Nov. 2.—(UP)—Police and union dock laborers fought for half an hour in the streets today. The police, confronted by 1,000 workmen, were outnumbered and fired on the crowd. Three men were wounded, one seriously.

It was the most serious disorder growing out of the recently settled water front strike. The union men angered at the protection given to volunteer workers who took their places during the strike, attacked a group of volunteers in the street.

Police tried to stand between the two factions but were stoned by the rioters. Finding their batons useless, the police fired over the heads of the crowd as a warning. It resulted in a concerted charge by the mob, and the police fired into the crowd. During the struggle, dozens of men were pushed into the harbor. All were pulled out.
