TOKYO IN TUMULT WITH REJOICING AS CITY WAITS FOR DEPARTURE TODAY OF EMPEROR FOR ENTHRONEMENT IN KYOTO

Grand Procession to Start Tuesday Morning From Chiyoda Imperial Palace to Tokyo Station; Troops Will Guard Line

TOKYO, Nov. 5.—(Special to The Japanese American News)—Amid Imperial pomp and grandeur and such rejoicing by the populace as never before witnessed in the Empire of the Rising Sun, Their Imperial Majesties the Emperor and Empress of Japan, escorted by the Imperial guards, will proceed from the Chiyoda Palace early Tuesday morning on the first leg of their journey to Kyoto for the Enthronement, which takes place there on November 10.

CAPITAL IS DECKED WITH GAY COLORS

Police In Full Force Out to Keep Order Among Throng

TOKYO, Nov. 5.—(Special) Tokyo today is a fairland of color and rejoicing with great multitude of people already flocking from this morning with their "ben-ton" or lunches to the line of the Imperial procession which takes place tomorrow morning. It is predicted that by seven or eight o'clock this evening the entire line from Chiyoda Imperial Palace to the Tokyo Central station will be solidly packed with people out to witness the procession.
