BRAZIL OFFERS 25,000 ACRES IN AMAZON VALLEY FOR JAPAN COLONIZATION

40,000 to Migrate In Next Ten Years From Nippon

TOKYO, Oct. 31.—Japanese colonists are not "pouring into Brazil, but there is a steady drip which in forty-two years has settled 60,000 Japanese in the State of Sao Paulo. By the test of experience the experiment has succeeded, and consequently, not only is the migration to Sao Paulo being expanded, but steps are being taken to open up a new area at Acara in the Amazon Valley.

The Government of the State of Para has offered 25,000 acres of land at Acara to a Japanese corporation, the South American Development Company, formed to exploit the concession. This company is interested in cotton growing. Like the Lancashire interests that are promoting cotton cultivation in various parts of the British Empire, it foresees a day when the United States will absorb the whole of its own cotton, and it wishes to develop alternative supplies.

40,000 TO SETTLE IN 10 YEARS
In the next ten years the company proposes to settle 40,000 persons on its Amazon territory.

Up till now the average number Japanese emigrants to Brazil (Sao Paulo) has been a thousand yearly. The largest number of emigrants in any one decade was 12,543, from 1905-1915. In the next decade the emigrants decreased to 10,696. In 1925, however, 4,998 Japanese emigrants went to Brazil.

The new scheme proposes to settle 1,000 families, averaging four persons to a family, annually for the next ten years. If these hopes materialize from 5,000 to 10,000 emigrants in all will leave Japan yearly to settle permanently in Brazil. As the population of Japan is now increasing at the rate of slightly over a million a year, the Brazilian project, even if successful, will take care of at most 1 per cent. of the annual increase.

DOES NOT SOLVE PROBLEM
At the end of the next ten years 100,000 to 150,000 Japanese may have been transplanted to Brazil, but in the same period 10,000,000 will have been added to the population at home. The new scheme, while an interesting enterprise, is consequently of small practical importance in the solution of the population problem.

The South American Development Company was floated early in 1928 with a nominal capital of \$5,000,000, of which \$1,125,000 is paid up. A second installment, of the same amount will be called up three years after the enterprise has actually begun to operate. A telegram from Buenos Aires received in Tokyo on Oct. 18 stated that construction of the first immigrant station at Acara would begin next month. The balance is not to be called up until the corporation has begun to earn dividends.

The working capital of the scheme is therefore \$2,500,000, and the company's plans for the ensuing ten years look forward to the settlement of 40,000 people (10,000 families who will maintain themselves and earn dividends by producing rice, cotton and tobacco. Rubber also appears among the prospective enterprises of the company, but with the commodity at its present price there is no incentive to plant.

TEXTILE MAN HEADS
The South American Development Company is headed by a well-known business man, Hachiro Fukuhara, who has left the directorate of the Kanegafuchi Spinning Company, one of the largest textile corporations in Japan, in order to devote himself to the development of Japanese colonization and cotton growing in Brazil.

He is now in the Amazon Valley with an investigating party which includes a physician, several agricultural experts, and officials of the corporation. The exploiting corporation will reserve about 375,000 acres of the concession for its own operation.

SYSTEMATIC SETTLEMENT
Japanese immigrants in the State of Sao Paulo now number between 55,000 and 60,000, and own 1,059,911 acres of cultivated land. Japanese settlement in Brazil began on a systematic scale in 1913 when Viscount Shibusawa promoted the Brazil Colonial Company with a capital of \$500,000. This has been reorganized as the Kaigai Kogyo Kaisha which owns 150,000 acres of Iguape and has settled 500 families.

Various smaller enterprises are engaged in the work of establishing Japanese settlers in Brazil. The Tokyo Government, which at first confined itself to supervising this emigration now takes a more active part in the movement, and the Social Affairs Bureau of the Home Office will ask for an appropriation of \$5,000,000 in the next budget for

EBINA NEED NOT RESIGN

So Says Japan Ruler Following Fire At Doshisha

KYOTO, Nov. 26.—(Special)—His Imperial Majesty the Emperor today advised officials of the Doshisha University to remain in office and continue their work in the interest of Japanese education rather than resign their posts as a result of the fire, which wiped out the preparatory college building near the Kyoto Imperial Palace a few days ago.

Dr. Danjo Ebina, president of the university, and the governor of Kyoto prefecture were among those who, taking the responsibility of the disaster during the stay of His Imperial Majesty in the city of Kyoto for the Coronation, tendered their resignations. Despite the suggestion of the Japanese Ruler, the Board of Regents of the university voted to resign as a body.

JAPAN TOPIC OF ADDRESS

Reverence for Age Is Characteristic of Nippon
The greatest factor for the promotion of World peace is education. This was the conclusion expressed by both speakers at the luncheon meeting of the San Francisco Center Wednesday, Harold W. Hackett, trustee and treasurer of Kobe College, and Dr. E. Guy Talbot, welfare worker in a number of European countries. The session was held at the Hotel St. Francis.

Hackett outlined the background of present day Japan: "All the great movements which have been spread over about six centuries in Western civilization, and Renaissance, the Reformation and the Industrial revolution—have broken all at once upon Japan. And Japan has received them with rapidity and intelligence."

"Three characteristics are predominant in Japan—reverence for age, love of youth and respect for knowledge. Gray hair and a bald head are entrees to preferment."

He described the educational system of present-day Japan and the place held in that system by Kobe College.

"Besides these phases," he added, "there is the Japan of the tourist—Japan of the temples, pagodas and a thousand islands in the gleaming sea—Japan of the cherry blossoms, wisteria and the sacred lotus. It has truly been called 'the flowery kingdom.'"

Dr. Talbot emphasized three phases of the relationship of America with Turkey: The missionary phase, the lack of treaty standing, and the educational influence.

LOCAL MAN INJURED IN CAR MISHAP

T. Murata Recovering From Bone Fracture at Hospital

Toyotaro Murata, aged 59, who was hit by an automobile driven by John L. Jauret, 262 Funston Ave., and seriously hurt Sunday morning on Bush street near Webster, is rapidly recovering at the Lane Hospital. The accident occurred when Murata tried to cross Bush street from the north side at a point 25 feet east of the corner of Webster and Bush. According to the police investigation and the witnesses, the car was not going over 18 miles, when it struck the Japanese pedestrian as it went over the sidewalk trying to avoid him.

MURATA WILL LIVE
Jauret immediately called the ambulance, and Murata was treated for shock and bruises and fractures of bones in his left leg by Dr. Rybins at the Central Emergency Hospital. As soon as he became conscious, he was removed to the Lane Hospital where he is now under the care of Dr. Cowan, who yesterday told the press that Murata will live.

The Japanese victim of the accident has been lodging at the Yamaguchi Hotel on Bush street. He is employed in an American family. He came to this country some twenty years ago. In 1925 he returned on a brief visit to his native place in Asa County, Hiroshima prefecture.

Following the accident, Dr. Motoo Itatani, friend of Murata, sent for Shiochi Shigetake of Mountain View a relative of the injured.

The United States Chamber of Commerce Endorses Pacific Relations Institute Sponsored by 160 Leading Business Men

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—Endorsement of the plan of 160 business leaders to bring about better relationships among the nations bordering on the Pacific by frank discussion of the mutual problems was given today by the U. S. Chamber of Commerce.

The organization of business men is known as the Institute of Pacific Relations. The original and unique method of dealing with international questions includes intensive and continuous research and

regular meetings where leaders of all Pacific Nations discuss frankly the most disputed and controversial questions in a friendly atmosphere.

"It is a hopeful sign when American business and professional men take an active interest in our relations with foreign affairs," said the Chamber. "They appreciate that foreign relations are human relations and that from small misunderstandings too often grow commercial and even armed warfare."

Seeks Equal Rights For People of Korea

KYOTO, Nov. 26.—(Special)—Li Kel Kan, 27, a Korean made an unsuccessful attempt to present a direct appeal to His Imperial Majesty the Emperor yesterday as the latter was on his way back to Kyoto from his visit to the tomb of the late Emperor Meiji at Momoyama.

Dashing up to the Imperial carriage in front of the Higashi Hongwanji Temple within the city of Kyoto, the Korean attempted to present the written petition when he was rudely brushed aside and taken into custody by the guards.

Investigations revealed that the letter contained an appeal to enfranchise the Korean subjects and give them equal rights with the Japanese in respect to military and naval obligations. Kan is an employee of the sake merchant in Himeji, Hyogo prefecture.
