## SAC'TO SET FOR BIG GRID TILT SUNDAY

SACRAMENTO, Nov. 29.—(Special)—All eyes will be turned again to the Capital City Sunday when the West Coast Produce eleven of Berkeley meets the victorious Sacramento Japanese Student Club boys at the Yolo ground here in the Northern California classic. The kick-off will be made at 2:30 o'clock.

Because of the stubborn defense it put up against the Samurais of the Showa Club and its easy victory over the Walnut Grove grid-ders, the Sacramento pigskin warriors are expected to carry off the banner Sunday.

### BERKELEY SQUAD

Although this is the first clash of the Berkleys, they are confident of success because of their individual experiences. They are all former stars of high schools or some other organizations. With the possible exception of S. Iwai, speedy quarterback, and K. Ueyama, end, the team possesses the advantage of uniform weight and height, which should aid them considerably in effecting trick plays.

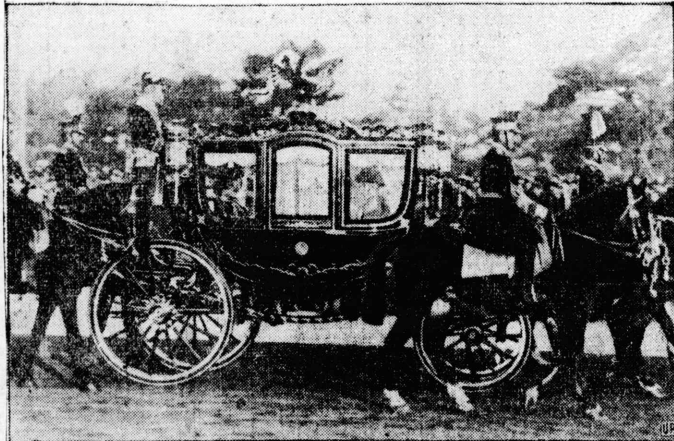
Another important decision among others was that of obtaining the liberty of religious education in middle schools.

The Conference which opened Wednesday morning will close at four o'clock Friday with prayer meeting. The entire gathering, except for the deliberation of the various special groups, were held in the auditorium of the Aoyama Gakuin and were presided over by Dr. D. Tagawa of the Meiji Gakuin.

The Christian Educational Association is composed of representatives of various schools in Japan under the management of foreign missions, and delegates from these institutions meet yearly to discuss the particular problems which affect them. Representatives gathered in Tokyo for this year's conference reached 65, including 10 foreigners. Some Japanese delegates have come from Hokkaido and Kyushu.

### Reports Coronation To Spirit of His Late Father

TOKYO, Nov. 29.—(Special)—Under the cloudy autumn sky Their Imperial Majesties the Emperor and Empress departed from the Imperial palace this morning at eight o'clock to report the enthronement to the spirit of his departed father, the late Emperor Taisho, at the tomb in South Tama County, Tokyo Prefecture. The travel between the Asakawa station to the Imperial tomb was made in carriage with all the pomp of a formal procession.

Tomorrow the last of the Enthronement rites will be completed when the Emperor reports the momentous event of His Imperial ancestors in the sacred Koreiden shrine within the Chiyoda Palace in Tokyo.

### Economic, Intellectual Cooperation Aim of Dipomat to Foster International Friendship Says Katsuji Debuchi

(continued from yesterday) Debuchi was in his office at Seoul when he heard the cannonade of the Japanese fleet off Chemulpo. He recalls the thrill with which he heard the opening shots of the Russo-Japanese war, out of which his country emerged as a great power. As Vice Consul at Seoul, he learned that diplomacy was something more than a pastime for parlor dilettantes. He learned that it was a calling which exacted much of those who wished to render their country distinguished service. The training he received as a diplomatic subaltern at Seoul he counts a most valuable one.

When in Korea, Debuchi met Alice Roosevelt, now the wife of the Speaker of the House. She was then making a trip through the Far East. "Mrs. Longworth probably does not remember me in Seoul," he remarked, "but meeting the daughter of an American President was a notable event to the young Japanese Consul in Seoul." He also met the late E. H. Harriman and the members of his party, who made a visit to the Far East about that time to investigate the possibilities of railroad development in Manchuria. Thus his contacts with Americans go back to a quarter of a century.

In 1907 Debuchi went to Berlin as Third Secretary of the Embassy. He stayed in Germany for a number of years adding German to the foreign languages which he can speak and read. Germany had provided Japan
