Sino-Japanese Commerce Pact Is Under Study

TOKYO, Jan. 21.—(Special)—The Japanese Imperial Cabinet, headed by Premier Tanaka, will go into a full session tomorrow and carefully go over the full text of the Sino-Japanese tariff treaty which has been negotiated by Consul General Yada and Finance Minister Soong at Shanghai.

Following their deliberation, the cabinet members will present the treaty to the Privy Council for ratification. Those who are acquainted with the Sino-Japanese relations and the purport of the proposed treaty are of the opinion that it will be ratified by both the Cabinet and the Privy Council and will be put into force by the first of next month.

MERRITTS HAS SPEED

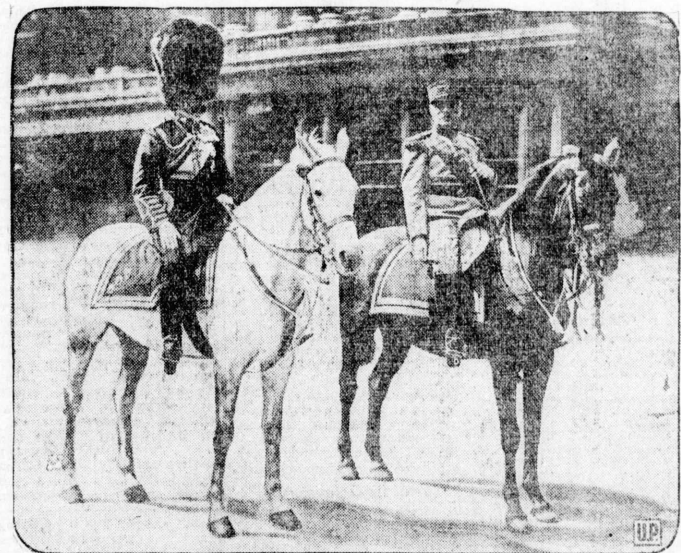

'ZEP' TO HOP TO TOKIO ON WORLD TOUR

Chinese Plans Trans-Pacific Flight Via Hawaii Islands

FRIEDRICHSHFEN, Germany, Jan. 21.—The Zeppelin construction works are formulating plans for a world flight by one of their craft next summer by way of Siberia, Tokyo, California, Lakehurst, N. J., and Europe.

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 21.—Major Tien Lai Huan, 27 year old Chinese aviator and author, announced here today that he planned to return to his native country by flying across the Pacific from one of the California air fields.

The proposed flight, he said, would not be a non-stop attempt but landings would be made at Hawaii and the Midway Islands.

He said the total distance would be about 9000 miles.

MAN IS VICTIM OF SLAYER IS THEORY GIVEN

Mysterious Death of Man Baffles Salt Lake Police

By OUR CORRESPONDENT SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 21.—(Special)—A baffling mystery surrounds the death of Nobushige Kashino, a young Japanese of about 32 years, whose body was found badly mutilated Thursday morning about nine o'clock along the track passed by the Denver Rio Grande train at Euclid avenue and Redwood street.

At first it was thought that the man was accidentally struck and killed by the passing train, but on further investigation many evidences tend to confirm the belief that there was a treachery connected with his strange death.

The belief is current here that he was robbed, and then killed by some unknown thug, and his body placed at the railway intersection where it was later crushed by the Denver Great train.

"SHADOWING HIM"

My personal investigation, which I conducted at Nephi Cafe, at Nephi, Utah, where he was last seen, disclosed some pertinent information that are illuminating. The stage stopped at Nephi, on its way to Salt Lake City, at ten o'clock Tuesday night when Kashino got off from the bus and entered the cafe. Kashino then wrote the address of his father at Rupert, Idaho, with his fountain pen. He then requested Mr. Warwood of the cafe to send \$200, which he took out from his pocket, to his father. All this time there was another passenger, who had probably gotten out of the bus with Kashino, watching him at the cafe.

HE WAS DOPED

When his body was found by the side of the track, police found the wallet at the bottom of his grip which he had carried, but there was no money in it. I also uncovered the fact that two side pockets of the two trousseurs he wore were all cut off, but no knife was in his person or in the grip. In his right hip pocket an English love letter which he wrote was found, but no name was attached to it.

MYSTERIOUS PASSENGER

Warwood then continued, "The Japanese had two hundred thirty dollars in bills and about twenty dollars in gold and silver, which he asked me to send to his father at Rupert, Idaho. Finally he took my advice and put his wallet containing the money back to one of his trouser pockets. When he left here, he had already come to and was perfectly sound.

"I noticed that another mysterious looking passenger was always with me when I talked with Kashino. Maybe the stranger did not like Kashino to leave the money to me. When the stage started, the stranger said to me, 'I will take care of him all right.' I believe Kashino knew he was being followed, got scared, and wanted to send the money away through me. I am very sorry now that I did not do as he requested."

Tatsuno, Koba, Yamakawa and Shiozaki also played brilliantly for the winners.

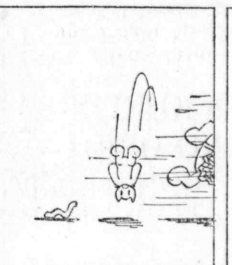
